

- Q. Is there any muskeg or swamp at Kitlope?
- A. No - no muskeg or swamp, we have lots of berries there.
- Q. What sort of berries?
- A. Salmon berries.
- Q. Do the Indians trap or hunt at Kitlope?
- A. Yes, they do.
- Q. What do they get?
- A. Marten, mink, fisher and bear.
- Q. Do you know whether the ground is stony or not?
- A. No, there is nothing but mud.
- Q. No big stones or boulders on the ground?
- A. No stones - nothing but mud.
- Q. Is it very wet land or dry land?
- A. Dry land.
- Q. How much of this land at Kitlope ^{is} land you could make gardens and grow things on - half of it or a quarter of it?
- A. Pretty nearly half of the whole reserve.
- Q. (The Chairman) It would be good land if the timber was taken off, for growing crops?
- A. Yes, for growing crops.
- Q. (Mr Young) Does anybody grow potatoes on it now?
- A.- Yes, we planted some this spring.
- Q. What is the ground like at Kemano, the ^{home} ~~state~~ village?
- A. There is nothing much grown there; it is dry at Kemano.
- Q. But you have some gardens there have you not?
- A. Yes, just in front of the houses.
- Q. Is there any land at Kemano which you could use for gardens but which you do not use?
- A. No, just in front of our houses is all that we can get for gardens.
- The Chairman: Apart from what is in front of the houses the rest is not of any use for growing potatoes or crops of any sort?
- A. Yes, that is right. Just in front of our houses is good for growing things to live on, but the other part is no good at all.
- Mr Young: Some of the Indians have asked the Ottawa government to move the home village from Kemano to Grab River: do you know anything about that?
