The visit of Brigadier Archibald to the local Salvation Army barracks which was to have been held on Sunday, has been postponed.

The funeral of the late Joel Winegarde took place this morning from his late residence, King street, to the Maple Leaf cemetery. Rev. Robert McCosh officiated.

County Treasurer Fleming noted this morning that some more of the summer birds had arrived from the South. Blackbirds and Ebenezers were in evidence to-day. The Ebenezers is a species of gray bird.

Judge Dowlin heard the appeals yesterday against the award of the Engineer, under the Ditches and Watercourses Act, for the drain on the 17th concession, Dover Tp. W. E. Gundy appeared for the township, and J. S. Fraser for J. W. Steinhoff, Henry Brown and Rufus Kinnelly.

Calixte Beaudard fished yesterday at his grounds above the Pere Marquette bridge. He also made three hauls this morning but met with poor success. Outside of one very large pickerel he didn't catch \$3.00 worth of fish altogether. The pickerel was one of the largest caught here in a long time.

A citizen calls the attention of the residents of Victoria avenue to the bad condition of the sidewalks along that street. He says that in the cases of many property owners on the street the sidewalks in front of their residences are disgraceful. A snow shovel could be made good use of.

Judge Houston drove to Kent Bridge yesterday. He says that after over half a century's experience with the roads of Kent county he reached the limit yesterday. In places the roads were muddy, in some places very muddy, in other spots there was snow, in others nice dry roads, and one place there was dust. Along by Fisher's the road is covered with about a foot of water. The snow banked on either side prevents the water getting away.

THEIR SEATS

Premier Whitney and Mr. Harcourt Allot Legislative Seats to the Followers.

The seating plan of the new Legislature was agreed upon by Premier Whitney and Mr. Harcourt and placed in the printer's hands to-day. Owing to the overwhelming majority of Conservatives some 20 Government supporters will have to sit on the Liberal side where there is, of course, plenty of room.

The Opposition has been given a solid section of 29 seats nearest the Speaker, consisting of the four front row double desks and all those behind them, the Government supporters not finding seats on the right being given the three front double desks and all behind them. So that the Government is almost as strong on the opposite side as the Opposition itself.

The plan shows that P. H. Bowyer, M. P. P., East Kent, will sit at the extreme end of the front row, while A. B. McCoig, M. P. P., will sit fourth in last row of the Opposition back benches.

BAREFOOTED CHILDREN

The Assessors Have Seen Some Sad Sights Amongst the City Poor

Many Families are Starving and Suffering—A Chance for the Charitably Disposed

"An assessor meets with strange experiences and gets a glimpse at life that other citizens have no idea exists," remarked Assessor Thomas French this morning. "There are quite a number of people belonging to missionary societies in this city who are sending clothing and necessities to the Indians of the Northwest. It would be a splendid idea if these charitably disposed ladies would devote a little attention to the needs of some of the poor people of this city. Mr. Gonne and myself have come across some very sad cases. Barefooted children are not at all unusual. One woman, whose husband died last winter, is practically starving with her five children. Many of the poor of the city are skinned and miserable existing on dry bread. The average citizen, in his own fine home does not realize that there are those who are suffering in wretchedness and want perhaps within a stone's throw of his door. Dooley was quite right when he said that a man would give a thousand dollars to charity if it would get his name in the papers. The clothes sent to Indians receives honorable mention, but in the meantime the people at home suffer."

IN DISGRACE

Czar Prints in Large Letters Word Which Ends Military Career of Russian General

(Special to The Planet.)
ST. PETERSBURG, March 17.—Emperor Nicholas has gazetted the removal IN DISGRACE of Gen. Kuropatkin, appointing Gen. Linevitch to immediately take charge as commander-in-chief of all Russian land and sea forces.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 17, 1.05 p. m.—With the Japanese hanging on the heels and flanks of the remnants of the broken, defeated Russian army, Gen. Kuropatkin, the old idol of the private soldier, has been dismissed and disgraced, and Gen. Linevitch, commander of the First army, is appointed to succeed him in command of all the Russian land and sea forces operating against Japan.

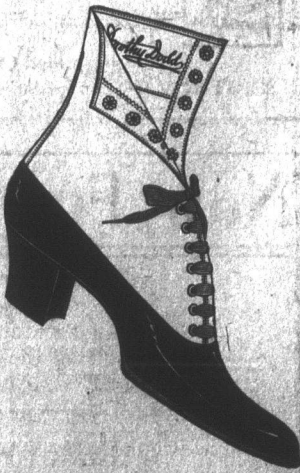
The word disgrace is written in large letters in the laconic imperial order gazetted, which contains not a single word of praise, and also disposes of the rumor that Kuropatkin had asked to be relieved. The Russian military annals contain no more bitter imperial rebuke.

Marconi Married.

London, March 17.—The marriage of Guglielmo Marconi to the Honorable Beatrice O'Brien, half sister of Lord Inchiquin, took place yesterday at St. George's Church, Hanover-square. Signor Marconi's mother and brother, the latter being best man, came from Italy for the ceremony. Lord Inchiquin gave away the bride, who was attended by four bridesmaids. The couple afterwards started on their honeymoon, which will be spent in Ireland. They expect to sail for New York March 25. Later, they will be the guests of King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena at the Quirinal.

Old Cabinet Returns.

Rome, March 17.—After two weeks of fruitless attempt to form a new Cabinet, Deputy Portia yesterday declined the task, and the members of the old Giolitti Cabinet held a council under the presidency of King Victor Emmanuel, who decided that they should all return to office.
