IS THE SUN COOLING?

Professor Langley Thinks It Is-His Reasons Therefor-Some Delicate Measurements of Radiant.

That the total amount of heat in the sun tends to be constantly lessened by radiation is believed by all astronomers. That its temperature remains practically the same from age to age is almost equally certain. What it is that restores or maintains this temperature is perhaps the fundamental problem of solar physics. Whatever its solution may be, exact measurements of the sun's radiation show that this fluctuates considerably, and it is probable that these changes have an influence on the earth's weather. The most delicate measurements of radiant heat are those made with Professor Langley's bolometer, an instrument now so perfected that it will indicate the heat given out by a human face one-third of a mile distant. The results of some measurements of solar radiation made by Langley with this device are thus stated by C. W. Saleeby in the Academy and Literature, London. Says this writer:

"He (Langley) believes that at the end of March, 1903, contemporaneously with a marked increase in sun sents. That the total amount of heat in the

end of March, 1903, contemporaneous-ly with a marked increase in sun spots, end of March, 1903, contemporaneously with a marked increase in sun spots, something happened in the sun that caused a rapid fall in the solar radiation, which subsequently has continued to be about 10 per cent. less than before. What the cause of this fall may have been we cannot conjecture, but it is interesting to inquire what consequences it had for the earth. According to Professor Langley, such a change in the sun would reduce the temperature of the earth's surface by something less than 7.5 degrees C.—18.5 degrees F. Now, when attention is directed to the exact observations made at eighty-nine stations in the north temperate zone and when these are compared with the results of many previous years it is found that a definite fall of more than 2 degrees did actually occur, nor is it possible to conceive 'what influence, not solar, could have produced this rapid and simultaneous reduction of temperatures over the whole north temperate zone and continued operative for so long a period.' While we remain ignorant of the cause of this solar change we cannot make any predictions as to its persistence or possible accentration. All we can conclude is that our tenure persistence or possible accentuation.

THE NEW FRENCH PREMIER.

Second Time M. Bouvier Ha. Been Premier of the Republic in His Long Public Career.

M. Rouvier, the new Premier M. Rouvier, the new Premier of France, has had a long public career. This is the second time he has been Premier of the Republic. He was first elected to the National Assembly in 1870, and six years later was elected secretary of the Chamber of Deputles. Under the Premiership of Leon Gam-betta and Jules Ferry, he held office as Minister of Commerce. Finally, in 1887 the turn of the political wheel brough M. Rouvier himself to the top, and he succeeded in forming a ministry, ir which he held the two posts of President of the Ministers, or Premier, and Minister of Finances; he will hold the same positions in the present Ministry. Initiatry, Mr. Rouvier won distinction by his firm and courageous stand against Boulanger, who as head of the military party, was a prominent factor in French politics of the time. M. Rouvier pricked the Boulanger bubble and Gen. Boulanger himself shortly after committed suicide.

M. Rouvier was born in the south of France, began as a clerk in a bank in Marseinites, and is a self-made man; he has a characteristic Gallic face—the pointed moustache, the keen eye, the touch of baldness so common among intellectual Frenchmen. He carries the atmosphere of a man of affairs berhaps more than a statesman; but today, when business interests are 20 great, the statesman must be something of a man of affairs, and the man of affairs who succeeds on a great scale must be something of a statesman. The ministry of M. Rouvier is likely to be identified prominently with a measure which has so far been as unpopular in France as in other countries—the momentax, which will have the first place in the program of the new Cabinet.
