Mercantile Summary.

THE statement of the Boston Oil Company, doing business as refiners in the Canadian oil-regions, and which suspended payment some time ago, shows liabilities to the amount of \$33,000, and assets to the amount of \$10,000.

On the 24th inst., the United States Treasury Agents seized eleven and a-quarter tons of raisins belonging to T. & F. Ross & Co., of Montreal. The raisins were seized for having been fraudulently undersinvoiced and entered as to quality at St. Albans, Vermont. This little circumstance requires explanation.

Our Petrolia correspondent makes the rather startling statement that unless new wells are found the export firms will have to cease operating, owing to the falling off in the supply of oil. Existing wells cannot produce more than enough for home consumption, and may be expected to fall even short of that after a time. It is to be hoped that so serious a blow to our industry may be averted by the sinking of new and profitable A large stock always on hand 6 34-ly wells ; no doubt the strain on the Petrolia Terri-
