"Parliament towards defraying the necessary expences of defending protecting and securing the British Colonies and Plantations in America." But supposing these as well as the other revenues collected in the Province had been in the first instance appropriated to the defraying the expences thereof, the expenditure has still exceeded the receipts in the sum of sisteen thousand sour hundred thirty sour pounds eleven shillings and one penny half penny sterling.

The order of the day for the taking into confideration the amendments to the Bill, to establish the form of Registers of Baptisins, Marriages and Burials, and which provides for the want or loss of said Registers; being read,

Mr. De Bonne, moved seconded by Mr. Coffin,

That the faid Bill be recommitted to the Committee that reported thereon, with an instruction to the said Committee, to add to the said Bill clauses to the following purport,

1. That no Curate, Vicar, Priest or Minister, doing the Parochial duty of any Parish in this Province, shall presume or take upon him to inter or bury the body of any person deceased, considered as belonging to his Parish or communion, before thirty six hours from the time of its decease, under a penalty of—pounds current money of this province.

2. That every Curate, Vicar, Priest or Minister doing the Parochial duty of any Parish in this Province, who shall from the time he has been informed thereof, neglect or refuse to inter or bury the body of any person deceased, considered as belonging to his Parish or communion, after the time above fixed, and shall not within twenty sour hours after the faid time is expired, comply therewith, shall incur a fine of pounds current money of the Province.

3. That from the first day of the month of June in the year of our Lord 1796, every Curate, Vicar, Priest or Minister doing the Parochial duty of any Parish, Church or community situated within the walls of any City or Town in this Province, who shall presume to inter or bury
