LIVE STOCK MARKETS TORONTO.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards since Saturday morning were 144 carloads, comprising 2087 cattle, 467 hogs, 147 sheep and lambs, 115 calves and 916 horses. The bulk of the horses were in transit to France.

Butchers Cattle—After deducting the feeders and milkers there would be about 1000 offered as fat. The quality of these was much improved over last Monday week that is, there were good, to choice lots and smaller number of the common and medium classes. Trade was good and steady all afternoon with prices 10c higher, especially for good quality cattle. Straight loads of choice cattle sold at \$7.75, \$7.80 and \$7.85. A choice lot of five steers, 1450 lbs. each, sold at \$8.40.

There were not enough hogs to make a market, not more than 1000 being offered. The best house hogs were at \$6.00 to \$6.50. Choice milkers, \$11.00 to \$11.50. Choice feeders, \$7.00 to \$7.50. Choice milks and springers at \$6.50 to \$7.00. Good cows at \$6.50 to \$7.50; common cows at \$4.00 to \$6.00.

Veal Calves.—Choice, \$11 to \$12; good \$10 to \$10.75; common, \$8.50 to \$9.75; heavy, fat calves, \$7 to \$8.50.

Sheep and Lambs.—Light sheep, sold at \$8.50 to \$9.50; heavy sheep at \$7 to \$8; culls at \$6 to \$6.50; choice lambs at \$11.50 to \$13.50; cull lambs at \$9 to \$10.

Hogs.—Selects, weighed off cars, \$10.15; \$9.75, fed and watered; \$9.40 f.o.b. cars. For heavy, fat, thin, light hogs 50c per cwt. is being deducted; \$3.40 off for sows; \$4 off for stags from prices paid for selects; half of one per cent. off all hogs for inspection.
