The question may be asked: "Where will the miners and muckers come from to man the Le Roi?" To those who have given the situation a little thought the answer to the query is readily at hand. Coeur d'Alenes at the present time closeare forced to the conclusion that it is more profitable for them to leave their lead ores stored in the bosom of the earth rather than mine under existing conditions. The production of lead ores has reached a stage where it has been found necessary to call a halt in the output if prices are to be maintained on a basis that will permit the mine owner to reap a reasonable profit on the sum he has invested in his mining venture. That these conditions actually exist is so well known to all who read the daily press of the Northwest that it seems superfluous to refer to the various instances of curtailed output and mines closing down that have been chronicled during recent weeks. The inevitable result of the curtailing of mining operations in the Coeur d'Alenes must be to throw out of employment a large number of skilled miners, far more than car ever secure employment in the Rossland mines.
