"Voodooists" Are Arrested

Atrocious Crimes by Ne-
gro Sect in Island of
Cuba.

HAVANA, Dec. 12.—Fourteen ne-
groes and whites have been arrested
recently in connection with the "voo-
doo" practices in the province of Ma-
tanzas. They are charged with having
sacrificed a six year old white girl,
but much "mystery" surrounds the
crime.

The witchcraft association, which
for the last few years has been op-
erating extensively, is being investi-

gated rigorously by the police. The
courts also have inaugurated a cam-
paign against the practices of the
"voodooists," and the indignation of the
people has been aroused against them.
To this association are attributed
many crimes, the murder of a girl,
Edna Hernandez at Artemisa, of a
boy at a town called Pedro Belaw-
court, and of girls at Alacranes, Re-
co and Vedado.

The murder of the girl Zoila at
Vedado was committed by the noto-
rious wizard, Bocu, who was executed.
The Alacranes murderers were sen-
tenced to imprisonment for life, but
some of them are now enjoying lib-
erty, because of executive pardon.

REV. T. A. WRIGHT FORCED TO RETIRE

Brantford Rector Granted
Superannuation Because
of Illness

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Rev. T. A.
Wright of Brantford, was yesterday
granted his request for superannua-
tion by the executive committee of
the Synod of Huron. Doctors' certi-
ficates showed that Mr. Wright is in-
capacitated for active service for some
time at least.

It was reported that the M. S. C.
C. apportionment for the present year
has been increased some \$50,000.
This means an increase of some \$5-
00 for this diocese. His Lordship
Bishop Williams stated that he had
vigorously opposed the increase when
it was made, but expressed the opin-
ion that as the amount has been fixed
and is all nothing more than is
needed, the people of the diocese
ought to make every effort to raise
every cent of it.

The finance committee report was
read and adopted.
The missionary committee reported
recommending the application for su-
perannuation from the minister of
Teeswater; that the parishes of St.
James' and St. Paul's, in Brantford,
be supplied as heretofore by a stu-
dent; that \$100 be placed in the Bis-
hop's hands to carry on services at
Wheatley and Staples and that the
parochial assessments for the year be
confirmed except when varied by the
report of the diocesan commissioner.

The report of the land and invest-
ment committee was carried.
The report of Huron College pub-
lic fund, showing the results of the

canvass of the last three months, gave
the net result of the campaign so far
as \$15,000.

The committee on the allocation of
the Chatham Glebe income reported
progress and asked leave to sit again.
A nice point in church law was
pointed out by F. P. Betts in dis-
cussing the dispute arising over the
sale of the rectory at Euphrasia.
The congregation there wish to de-
vote the money to relieving the
church debt, but this is impossible it
was demonstrated, as according to the
act of parliament incorporating the
synod, this money must be placed
in trust in the synod's hands to be
used for the comfort of the minister.
The bishop was appointed to look
after certain business touching the
synod office.

SIR JAS. WHITNEY'S ILLNESS SLIGHT

No Chance Whatever of His
Retiring From the
Premiership.

TORONTO, Dec. 12.—A rumor or-
iginating in Liberal sources here yes-
terday destined Hon. Adam Beck to
be premier of Ontario within the near
future. Such a possibility, however,
is not credited with any foundation,
among Government authorities. On
the contrary it is pretty well known
that no shift will be made among
the present cabinet members for some
time if not for years.

Never Considered.

Your correspondent learned from a
most reliable authority that any talk
of Sir James' vacation of the prem-
iership has never been suggested in the
Cabinet in any way and that the min-
isters have never talked the matter
over. The indisposition from which
he is now suffering is slight in its na-
ture and he is merely enjoying a holi-
day that will in some ways take the
place of the many vacations which he
has spent at his office desk. There
was no doubt whatever, he said, that
Sir James would take his accustomed
place in the Legislature in the spring.
In the event of a shift in the cab-
inet it is conceded by some that
Western Ontario may be expected to
provide the new Cabinet head. Be-
cause of no immediate demand for
such change the opinion is fairly well
divided.

As a logical sequence and by rea-
son of seniority in the House Hon.
W. J. Hanna is in direct line. His
work since association with the gov-

ernment has been of the most bene-
ficial kind to the country and the ap-
preciation of his ability has been
marked time and again.
Hon. Adam Beck, on the other hand,
has been looked to by a great many
as a desirable successor to Sir James.
His personality in a great many ways
resembles that of the premier and his
work in the Hydro-Electric Commis-
sion has shown his splendid grasp
on public affairs.

EXECUTION MUST BE CARRIED OUT

Arthur Bosworth, Englishman,
is Sentenced to be
Hanged.

(Canadian Press Despatch)

MONTPELIER, Vt., Dec. 12.—Gov-
ernor Fletcher has denied the peti-
tion for a stay of execution for Ar-
thur Bosworth, sentenced to be hanged
on January 2 next for the murder
of Mac Labelle at Essex Junction in
June, 1911. Bosworth's attorneys bas-
ed their petition on the claim that
the prisoner had not been given his
constitutional rights for a hearing be-
fore the Legislature in 1912, when a
bill to commute his children had been
introduced.

Counsel for the condemned man
also said that because of the fact that
Bosworth was a British subject, the
British embassy at Washington was
reviewing the case and might ask for
a stay of execution.

Bosworth has a wife and child in
England.

Miss Sylvia Pankhurst was arrested
after addressing a big meeting in the
east end of London. Her bodyguard
were no match for the police, who
failed to be attracted by a rear door,
where a dummy dressed to resemble
her had been taken.
