LAWYERS LISTEN BUT DO NOT ACT ON SUGGESTIONS

Complaint of Legal Lights at Ontario Bar Association. TRYING TO PUT THROUGH REFORMS

"Votes for Women" is Used in Committee's Report. "Year after year," says the report on Law Reform, before the Ontario Bar Association, at the annual meeting at Osogode Hall yesterday, "your committee has suggested and recommended legislation to improve the law, but very few of these sugges- tions or recommendations have found their way into the Statutes. Your committee has almost come to the conclusion that it is useless to recom- mend further amendments to the law if these are to meet with the same fate as former ones."

National Unemployment Fund—The first account of the Unemployment Fund of the National Insurance Act shows receipts of \$2,011,504, the contri- butions of employers and workmen being £1,822,937, and the sum pro- vided by the State £380,062, which was received as interest on £8,223 investments. The chief disburse- ments were—Unemployed benefi- taries—£1,183,193; repay- ment to workmen, £183,193; repay- ments to unemployed benefi- taries—£25,124; salaries and other charges, £1,800; Commissioners for the Re- duction of the National Debt, for in- terest, £1,610,000; balance, £38,907.

REDMOND FAVORS COMPULSIONS ACT

London, Jan. 12.—At the opening of the debate on the second reading of the Military Service Bill in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon John E. Redmond, Parliamentary leader of the Irish Nationalist party, announced that the Nationalists would put forward no further opposition to its passage. Having made their protest and observed the overwhelming majority in its favor, he stated in his speech there would be no more demonstra- tions on their part.

It is now believed that the minority voting against the bill on the second reading will be almost negligible. The only members still expected to stand against it are Sir John Simon and a few Radical members who have al- ready received signs of disapproval from their constituents.

AMAZINGLY WELL. Augustine Birrell, the Irish Secre- tary, replying to Sir Edward Carson said: "The Government never con- sidered the application of the bill to Ireland, for they could not hope to establish in Ireland those appeal tribunals wherein the success of the bill in Great Britain depends. Ire- land has done wonderfully well, but I say 'Do not rush her.' Irish loyalty is a plant that has to be nurtured, never pulled up by the roots. If before the war anyone had told me that Ireland would have started at 'him in wild surprise, and whisper, 'You don't know what you are talk- ing about.' 'Remembering Irish history, I dare say Ireland has not done amaz- ingly well.'"

PROPERTY CONSCRIPTION Referring to suggestions regarding the conscription of property, Sir Ed- ward declared he would not shrink from it if necessary in this way to raise funds to win the war. "What good is property to me," he said, "if I have to hang my head in shame?"
