CANADIAN LOSSES TOTAL 52,026

Since Commencement of the War—Includes Wounded and Missing.

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Up till October 11 the total number of casualties among officers and men of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces was 50,926, according to figures compiled by the Casualty Record Office. The number is made up as follows:

Killed in action, 8,134.
Died of wounds, 3,120.
Died of sickness, 452.
Presumed dead, 1,009.
Missing, 1,372.
Wounded, 37,939.

FIGHTING CONTINUES WITH MUCH VIOLENCE IN THE TRANSYLVANIA

Roumanian Forces Offer Stubborn Defence to Pursuing Austrians—Review of the War Situation.

London, Oct. 13.—

While the Entente armies in northern France and in the Austro-Italian war theatre are keeping up their heavy blows on the lines of their Teutonic foe, the latter is continuing to counter heavily by delivering crushing strokes on the Transylvania front.

The Roumanians are being forced back in Northeastern Transylvania as well as along the Roumanian border in the Hermannstadt and Kronstadt regions, according to the current war office reports. Vienna claims that the Roumanian resistance has been broken on both sides of the Maros River, where Berlin yesterday announced an encircling movement in progress. The Roumanians are declared to be in flight here, while their retreat continues near Kronstadt, where King Ferdinand's troops are falling back towards the frontier passes.

Italian gains in the fighting Wednesday on the Carso front, where General Cadorna is pushing towards Trieste are admitted by Vienna, which mentions progress for the Italians east of Oppachiasella and their capture of the town of Novavas.

An air raid carried out by forty French and British machines on the Mauser Works at Oberndorf, Germany, during which four tons of explosives were dropped and six German machines were shot down as they attempted to defend the works, is announced by Paris.

No infantry action in the Somme region is reported by Paris to-day, but intense activity by the artillery is in evidence both north and south of the Somme. In the former region the French apparently are preparing for another drive in the regions of Morval and Bouchavesnes, while their guns are pounding the neighborhood of Chaumes, south of the river.

feating Brook
Olson's Error

Boston, Oct. 13.—Ivan Olson made a doubled-barreled error on one in the third inning of yesterday afternoon's game—and right then there there was written the "finish" on the world series entertainment of 1916. That brace fozzles by the Dodger shortstop the Red Sox into the lead and afterward were they headed. Ole bobbie-bobbie enabled the Sox to the fifth and deciding game in battle for the diamond champion of the world and permitted Boston to retain untarnished its record, never having lost in a combat for highest honors in baseball.

The thirteenth duel for the ball title now is history—but not the kind that Brooklynites read with any emotions akin to pride. The story of these games shows, on the whole, the players were outclassed; that they were better in every department of play than their own. And the inevitable resulted. In practically every pinch the Dodgers flivvered every crisis they played their baseball. Time and again at these five games a timely hit or have won for them; just as oft a bit of airtight work afield or have saved the game. But, except during the third game when they won, the Dodgers' strategy were impotent in moments when was necessary to produce a save and the infield insisted upon "cing" just at those moments when fozzle meant the loss of the game to them.
