Conservatives Win Both Alberta Seats

MacLeod, Alb., April 28—According to the final official count in the provincial election in this constituency, Premier Sifton was defeated by Robert Patterson by 31 votes.

Edmonton, Alb., April 28—Results received from Alexandria show the return of J. R. Lowery, Conservative, over M. C. Leyster, Liberal, by eight votes.

The totals are: Lowery, 478; Leyster, 470; Anderson, Socialist, 207.

The following seats go to the Conservatives, which were previously thought to be uncertain:

Rocky Mountain, majority, 31; Innisfail, majority, 9.

In the two latter there will be a recount, before a judge.

Municipal Council

The April Session of the Municipal Council of Kings County was held on Tuesday last, meeting in the Court House, Kentville, at 10 a. m.

The councillors were all present except Dr. Covert, Ward 1, A. Balsar, Ward 3, and W. C. Hamilton, Ward 9.

The minutes of January Term read and approved.

A petition from residents of Kingston and vicinity, in Ward 12, was read asking that a route be taken for new road from Kingston Station to Melvern Square differing from that selected by the Commissioner, H. J. Neily.

The Report of the Commissioner was read and on motion action was deferred to January Term, 1914.

Coun. Bishop moved, seconded by Coun. S. C. Parker, that the Experimental Station be authorized to take sand bank from highway opposite the station property and use same in grading, etc.

After some debate the motion carried.

The petition to close road through lands of Annie M. Stuart at Grand Pre, laid over from January Term, was read, and the law having been complied with, the prayer of petition was granted.

Read petition for new road from Kingston Station to Middle Road and on motion referred to Committee on Roads and Bridges to report at January Term, 1914.

Bad Rates were struck off as follows:

Arch Foster was appointed Commissioner to lay out change of Old Telegraph Road in Ward 9, Prof. A. E. Coldwell, appointed in January being unable to act.

A number of appointments of County Officers were made. W. Leander Wheaton was appointed Supervisor of Roads in Ward 3, in place of Jacob N. Wheaton, deceased.

Bill of John E. Coleman, Jailor, \$8.00, for painting and papering jail, was read and being approved by Chairman of Committee on Public Property, was ordered paid.

The Clerk stated that he had bill from Municipality of Annapolis County for costs in the trial of the Graves Brothers. The Solicitor had stated that the bill contained items which were not legally chargeable to this Municipality and had revised it, which revision was not satisfactory to the Annapolis County Officials.

In the absence of the Solicitor no action was taken.

Coun. Griffin reported verbally in the action of Committee on Public Property in the matter of appointment of an arbitrator by owners of lands taken for the right of way, etc., of the North Mountain Railway. The report was to the effect that a meeting was held at which the committee instructed the Warden not to certify the appointment of Mr. Berteaux as arbitrator. Since that time, however, an act had been introduced in the Legislature to legalize that appointment.

Markland Fruit Company, Kingston, petitioned Council for permission to lay rails on highway at Kingston Station to give train communication with warehouse. Prayer granted.

On motion Wm. Lockhart, Thomas Lockhart, Joseph Lockhart, and James Lockhart, Jr., were granted permission to do Statue Labor on the old road from the foot of Blue Mountain to William Lockhart's south line.

Coun. Balsar was, on motion, excused from attendance on account of illness.

By consent of Council Mr. G. R. Nichols spoke in reference to dog tax. He had paid such tax to the collector of Ward 13, in 1911. Others had done the same. The Collector had not made any return of the money so collected. Some action should be taken.

Mr. F. S. Fisher spoke on the same subject.

On motion the Council adjourned. —Register
