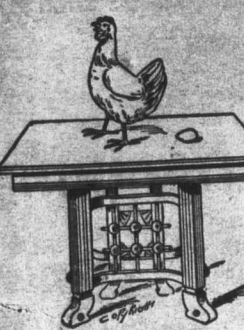

Rockingham needs a roller mill. Action is again agitating electric light. Ottawa is organizing a Cheese Board. Christian Island is covered with campers.

A fine High school will be built at Renfrew. St. Thomas female bicyclist was bloomer.

A fine new hotel has been opened at Colingwood. Bridgeport has fifty male and several female riders.

Orillia will furnish its new hall at a cost of \$60,000. Mount Forest citizens want a system of water-works.

Mr. A. E. H. Crooks is the new U.S. Consul at Barrie. Of the 25 inmates in the Barrie jail, 14 are vagrants.

Muskoka has twice as many tourists this season as last year. The Berlin Philharmonic Society numbers 115 members.

Wyoming and Alvinston business men compete at baseball. They are doing fall plowing in some parts of the country.

Brantford will have a 20-mile bicycle race on Labor Day. At Monfort the other day a good horse was sold for 75 cents.

The fare on Brantford's new electric railway is three cents. The Galt and Preston electric railway now extends to Preston.

It is again agitating the formation of an athletic association. Windsor and Chatham are entirely free from contagious diseases.

Eight country jail inmates are fed at a cost of five cents daily. At Sharlot Lake the other day a 17-pound salmon was caught in a greenhouse.

A recent hallmaster at Barrie broke 200 pounds of glass in a greenhouse. The North Brant Exhibition will be held at Port Elgin October 10 and 11.

All rural schools will open on the 19th and Normal schools on the 20th. The Canadian Temperance League will spend \$5,000 this year in its work.

Mr. Haglitz died recently at Tilbury Center, aged 101 years. Lobsters are shipped to England in cold storage, from Dartmouth, N.S.

A recent meeting of the Macdonald Council nearly broke up in a free fight. Midland will have a new fire hall and a number of new private residences.

Of the 75 Windsor Public school pupils who wrote for the entrance, 72 passed. There were 40 applications to teach the Bradford M. J. school, one term, for \$100.

A 16 years old last week landed a 300-pound muskashog at Brockville. The Essex Fusiliers' officers, Windsor, want to organize the corps as a city battalion.

There are more islands in the St. Lawrence now than ever before, owing to the low water. Mrs. Bolton, Parry Sound, died of grief for the loss of her husband.

Cookstown leads Simcoe County in agricultural production. A fish weighing 50 pounds, and over four feet long, was caught near Ottawa the other day.

Mr. R. Coombs, Georgetown, has been appointed headmaster of the Richmond Hill High school. A milking machine, milking ten cows at once, is being put up at the Guelph Agricultural College.

The first Berlin woman who rides a bicycle in bloomers will get a Berlin paper free for one year. An Orillia boy who opened a switch on the Midland was sent to the penitentiary for seven years.

The G. T. R. freight shed at Berlin was burned the other day, a spark from a passing engine starting the fire. The Lake of the Woods Milling Company is being built in Manitoba, with 750,000 bushels capacity.

Two horses, some stables and out-buildings of Lord Aberdeen's ranch, in British Columbia, have been burned. On account of the many accidents at barn raisings, it is proposed to make "barn-raising" an indictable offence.

The defunct Commercial Bank of Manitoba has declared another dividend of 13 per cent. Mr. F. Gledstone, of London, Eng., a director of the Grand Trunk railway, has arrived in Montreal on a trip.

In the Niagara district it is estimated apples will be half a crop, small fruits one-third, peaches one-third, and grapes half a crop. Manitoba expects to have a crop this season of 60,000,000 bushels of grain from 1,887,740 acres of land tilled by 22,000 farmers.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

Reading of the Queen's Speech by Commission.

IN THE HOUSE OF LORDS.
England's Foreign Relations Reviewed—The Recent Chinese Mission—The Irish Question—A Speech.

London, Aug. 18.—After the House of Commons resumed to-day, the members of the House of Lords met to read the Queen's speech by the Lord Chancellor, Baron Halsbury. It was as follows:
