By-law to assess and levy rates for the present year was passed with blanks filled as follows: County \$885.70, township \$700, "rai way \$831.45, high school \$862.50, general grants to public schools \$1388.13, road-making machinery \$1875, and for the different school sections—No. 1 \$100, No. 2 \$75, No. 4 \$100, No. 5 \$31.48, No. 7 \$100, No. 8 \$85, No. 9 \$38.50, No. 10 \$29.98, No. 12 \$300, No. 13 \$165.

The trustees of school section No. 6 were given permission to use our oil room for school purposes during the model term at usual rent.

The counties council were required to submit a by-law to a vote of the electors that the council shall be composed of the Reeves of the townships and villages.

Council adjourned until Dec. 15th at one o'clock.
