Scouting Party Sticks by a Wounded Officer

And is Surrounded by the Enemy Boers Driven Off with Considerable Loss.

London, January 2. - Owing lack of news from important points interest in the war centres on the comparatively unimportant skirmishing near Dordrecht. Capt. Montmorency's sortie with a patrol of 120 men of the 21st Lancers and his retreat Dec. 30 were followed up the next day by a successful engagement and the rescue of a small party supposed to be men Capt. Montmorency left behind him. Under Capt. Goldsworthy a force of 110 men, with four guns, accompanied by Capt. Montmorency's scouts, sallied out of Dordrecht during the morning of Dec. 31 to relieve Lieut. Turner and 27 men left over night at Labnschagnes Nek. The Boers were driven back and Lieut. Turner's party was rescued. Eight Boers and 13 horses are known to have been killed. The Times, in its second edition, publishes a despatch from Sterksstroom, dated Dec. 31, which says: — Capt. Montmorency's scouts were cut off owing to their refusal to leave a wounded officer Lieut. Warren, of Brabant's Horse. These men, under Lieuts. Milford and Turner, of the frontier mounted rifles, defended themselves most gallantly against the repeated attacks of some 800 Boers. morency's sortie with a patrol of 120 repeated attacks of some 800 Boers. The enemy resorted to sniping during night, but were repulsed with loss. At 5.15 a. m. Captain Goldsworthy, with the Cape Mounted Rifles, arrived with the Cape Mounted Rifles, arrived and the enemy immediately fled to the hills. Turner's party, whose horses had nearly all been killed, were rescued. They displayed splendid pluck, and the brilliant manner in which Capt. Goldsworthy effected their relief on his own regroupibility is deserving Capt. Goldsworthy effected their relief on his own responsibility is deserving of the highest praise. Our loss was two men wounded. The Boers lost about 30 men, including eight men killed. Another account says:—"The success of this little party will arrest the progress of the enemy's recruiting in that vicinity."

### BURIED IN STRAW.

Heg That Lived 134 Days Without Food or Drink.

Adrian, Mich., Jan. 2.—On the 13th of August last John Henry, of Ogden, threshed his grain. He had a large amount of straw and the stack tipamount of straw and the stack tra-ped over, burying a hog, which was crippled in such (a way as to have little use of its hind legs. Henry con-cluded that the pig would be smother-ed anyway, and took no steps to re-move it. Saturday before last Christmove it. Saturday before last Christ-mas the stack was being removed, and what was the astonishment of the workmen when they heard the grunt of a hog. When the straw was re-moved, the animal crawled out and began eating greedily of the straw with-in reach, She was a mass of skin and in reach, She was a mass of skin and bones, and unable to stand. She was given food and drink, and bids fair to "flesh up" soon. One man assisted it to stand on its feet for a sufficient time to enable a photograph to be taken. The hog was 134 days without food or drink.
