A—Tony Boy's Daisy, E. Shelly owner, vs. Lady Dot, J. Kime owner.

B—Lord Jingo, Marcon & Morton, vs. Nell's Dash, J. Mills.

C—Selkirk Hope, W. B. Wells, vs. Hidden Mystery, Graydon.

D—Top Gallant, Graydon, vs. Count of Kent, Aitken.

A start was made from the Rayment House at 10.45 a. m. Tony Boy's Daisy and Little Dot, handled by owners, were placed down on the bay side in a corn field, both dogs ranging well and cutting out their work in fine fettle. It may be remarked that Daisy is fresh from winning laurels in the Michigan field trials. She is a small animal of the setter class, quick and active, covering the ground well. After following the course on the bay view the judges elected to cross the Winter line into what appeared to be a country well adapted to the abode of the feathery tribe. cross the Winter line into what appeared to be a country well adapted to the abode of the feathery tribe. The handlers had not proceeded more than one hundred yards before Daisy pointed a bevy, being staunch and steady to fire. The birds were again found in a neighboring bush, where honors fell largely to Daisy, who made a most beautiful stand at the edge of a log with head protruding over it. She is very chedient and in all made a most creditable showing. As results stand after to-day's work she is looked upon as the winner, but still the weather was most unfavorable during the running of the last two braces, and results may change. The second brace were then put down

The second brace were then put down but were not successful in finding birds for some thirty five minutes. Both Lord lingo and Neli's Dash had splendid opportunities for singles and bevies but were, as it were, off color in pointing. Now, Daisy in the first heat had, it must be confessed, most favorable opportunities, but she took advantage of every one of them and besides, placed indifferent opportunities on the credit side of her balance. The running of both dogs was not more than ordinary, being quite evenly balanced.

The third brace, Selkirk Hope, W. B. Wells, and Hidden Mystery, Graydon, brought forth two speedy setters, quite different in style but much alike in ranging capacity. Selkirk Hope is a medium size black and white puppy, which improved in style and speed as the contest. the contest progressed Mr. Gray-don's Hidden Mystery, handled by Geo. Kime, is a short, thick-set black and white setter, and is very speedy. Both dogs range well and quarter the fields


