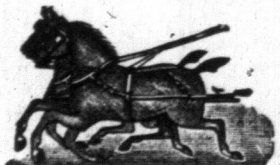

HER HEART WAS BROKEN

Mrs. Moak Wept Herself to Death
Over Her Husband's Grave.

When Found by the Sexton She Was Unconscious and Soon Expired.

Port Huron, April 22.—Weary of life and disconsolate over her husband's death, Mrs. Charles Moak, who was found unconscious on her husband's grave, Friday morning, died during the afternoon without recognizing her three sons, who stood at her bedside. The dead woman's wish had been gratified, and in a dramatic manner. Ever since his death, several months ago, it has been impossible to reconcile her to the situation, and day after day she would steal away from the city and spend several hours weeping out her sorrow on his grave. The constant strain weakened her physically. She has been boarding with Mrs. McKay, on Tenth street, and although it was known that she was grief-stricken, no watch was kept over her. Thursday afternoon, she called one of her boys, and talked with him some time, and bade him good-bye. That was the last time she was seen in a conscious condition. It is presumed that she went directly to the cemetery and cried herself to sleep on her husband's grave. The chilling weather soon benumbed her, and she lapsed into unconsciousness. All the night the woman remained on the grave of her husband with her hands clasped over his tombstone and her tears mingling with the night-dew.

In the early morning Sexton Penny went out to dig a grave and saw the form of a woman reclining against the monument. Nothing was thought of it at first, but when an hour later the woman still remained in the same position, an investigation was made. At first, it was thought she was dead, and a coroner was summoned. He saw that a spark of life still remained, and death was due to exposure as the woman was naturally weak. Mrs. Moak will be buried alongside of her husband, on whose grave she directly met her death. The deceased husband was a deputy customs collector, and died several months ago.
