GOOD MEN

James Clancy and W J Hanna will be a Source of Strength to the Conservatives in the Legislature.

The Mail and Empire in an article to-day in reference to the Conservative conference which is being held in Toronto, has the following to say:

Mr. W. J. Hanna, M. P. P., the brilliant member for West Lambton, said that Western Ontario might be depended upon to go almost solidly Conservative. Since the last election the Ross Government had been steadily losing ground in the west, and while many Liberals would probably vote against the Government, there was a great army of Liberal voters who would refrain from voting altogether.

Mr. James Clancy, the candidate for West Kent, was on hand early. He will add materially to the debating strength of the Conservatives in the Legislature.

CO. POLICE COURT

Levi Gallipo, of this city, came up at the County Police Court yesterday afternoon before Judge Houston, charged with theft.

Levi Harris, of the township of Camden, is the complainant. He claims that on the 21st of November he was drinking with Gallipo and some more fellows, and when coming down Queen Street he fell down on the sidewalk. Gallipo came along and, it is claimed, robbed him of his watch, jack-knife and a purse containing \$5 and a bunch of keys.

Gallipo, on the other hand, claims that he was not drunk, and when he saw Harris fall he stooped over him and tried to lift him up, but finally left him with his other friends. Gallipo's house was searched, but the stolen goods were not found. Both men had been drinking.

The trial was fixed for Nov. 12, but was adjourned until yesterday. It was further adjourned until December 1.

Twenty-Cent Stamp.

Ottawa, Nov. 24.—The 20-cent stamp has just been added to the King's head series of stamps, which now consist of six denominations, one cent, two cents, five cents, seven cents, ten cents and twenty cents. The color of the new stamp is the same as that of the 20-cent stamps in the Queen's head series.

London, Nov. 23.—Live cattle are quoted at 8 1/2c to 11 1/2c per lb.; refrigerator beef, at 8 1/2c to 8 3/4c per lb.; sheep, 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, Nov. 23.—About 900 head of butchers' cattle, 25 milch cows and springers, 75 calves, 1500 sheep and lambs, and 100 fat hogs were offered for sale at the East End Abattoir to-day. There were no prime beefers, nor very good medium cattle in the market, and the price was about the highest for some time. The price for the best of ordinary mediums, the common stock sold at 2c to 3c per lb., and the canners at 1 1/2c to 2c per lb. There was an active demand for moderately good cattle, but the common stock were dull of sale. There were no good milch cows in the market, and prices ranged from \$30 to \$40 each. There were no good calves on the market, and the young calves at \$2.25 to \$5 each. Shipping steers were 3 1/2c, and the others 3c to 3 1/2c per lb. Fat hogs are lower in price, at 4 1/2c to a little over 5c per lb.
