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Russia's Story Told on Screen.

'FALL OF THE ROMANOFFS' IS GREAT HISTORICAL FILM OF THE AGE.

MAD MONK IN EAST. ILLDOR, EXILED FROM HIS COUNTRY, APPEARS IN GREAT DRAMA.
