CALGARY NOW HAS REAL OIL IN COMMERCIAL QUANTITIES

What anxious investors in oil stocks in Calgary and throughout the country have been waiting for has finally arrived.

Practical test made before a large party from Calgary and surrounding towns, who visited the well last Sunday in company with Mayor Costello, President Graham, Manager Hanson, Northern Crown Bank, R. E. Meve and A. H. Schmitt.

Result of the personal inspection of the well and plant proves highly satisfactory to all parties concerned.

The examination was thorough and proves beyond question of doubt that oil now exists in Alberta in commercial quantities and is a paying investment.

In the first place the probes were shown the pumping apparatus in actual operation, and for the entire time the party was at the well the bull wheel was monotonously revolving and all the while a steady stream of dark olive green fluid, scintillating and bubbling in the sunlight, shot from the two-inch pipe into a big tank.

Seven of these tanks were recently installed at the well and six of these were full and that, into which the oil was flowing, was rapidly approaching its capacity.

As Good as Gold

These seven tanks contain approximately 300 barrels of oil, worth at the well side, \$100 a barrel or \$30,000. Almost as much more has been pumped out of the well and the oil level re-

mains stationary at 200 feet from the bottom of the bore. It is the belief of the experts who are in charge of the well that there is an inexhaustible supply available, and their experience to date lends color to this assumption. For days at a time the pump has been kept going the full twenty-four hours as a test but the level of the fluid has remained unchanged. When this fact was established, arrangements were made by President Graham to get tanks and equipment but this when installed, proved unequal to hold the oil that was on tap.

More Oil Than Tankage

It was obvious that with more of this tankage, a local market had to be secured, as the well would have to be kept in operation and facilities were provided, and fortunately a purchaser was found in the Calgary Petroleum

The Analysis of Prudential Oil

The Prudential oil, as analyzed, shows 50 degrees Baume and runs 61 per cent gasoline, 24 per cent kerosene, 9 per cent lubricants, and 3 per cent residuum. It is 99 per cent commercial value.

Now as it analyzes 50 per cent gasoline, a barrel of the Prudential oil will produce about 25 gallons of gasoline as well as other valuable products so that the company is getting more than its money even at \$200 a barrel. This fact, however, will pay a good profit when the company is able to handle all the Prudential oil that can be offered.

As the well is in a position to produce 100 barrels a day, it is estimated that it can be driven down to about 2,500 feet for about \$2,000. The money of the present well, along with the other data that the oil can be shipped from the well have been acquired, will make the second well a comparatively easy and inexpensive undertaking.

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Further drilling would be dangerous under present conditions for if a gas leak were struck, even a mild one, there would be a large waste of oil because of the absence of tankage and with this drilling over the country side, there would be a continuous risk of a catastrophe.

As the tankage is assured it is unlikely that the drill will be dropped any lower.

In the meantime the officials of the company will be satisfied, it is reported, with the output that is now being produced. They can get the oil to the market and can be sure of a good price for it.

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As the Prudential well was chosen wisely, for the oil is found at a depth of 200 feet in such quantities that it was deemed inexpedient to drill further until tankage was furnished. The well is about 1,000 feet shallower than other wells in the field.

One of the factors that will have an important bearing on the future of the Prudential well will be the construction of the Dominion Western railway which has been under construction for some time from this well. This railway will run from the well to the city, and will be a valuable link in the shipping of the oil.

FORTHCOMING INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION GREATER THAN EVER

It is not surprising to learn from Manager E. L. Richardson that the stockmen of the province have again entered their stock in large numbers for the big industrial fair, which will open June 29. To the Western Standard the manager said there was every reason to feel gratified at the entry list, and considering the revival in interest in live stock of all kinds owing to the enhanced prices which have been received and are likely to be sustained for some years to come, the breeders appear to be realizing the advantage of raising the best animals they can, and are recognizing the good work which exhibitions such as those at Calgary are doing along this line.

Every department will have a large representation which will include many of the fine animals which have previously carried off the ribbons in many of the western shows. In addition there will be new stock which is coming from distant points and will add to the interest of these competitions.

Word has been received of many shipments which are to be made by the prominent breeders of Ontario, in cattle, sheep and swine.

The quality of Alberta's horseflesh is so well recognized that any comment in advance would be superfluous as anyone who has ever attended a horse show knows that those animals have successfully competed against the best in some of the biggest shows on the continent. In the light and heavy classes there will be splendid competition.

Cattle will of course be here in large numbers and there will be more than ordinary interest owing to the entries from distant points. In providing the accommodation for the cattle this year it has been found possible to make a much better arrangement than last year. The stabling has been arranged in the centre of the horse show building and spectators will have the opportunity of seeing all the judging in these classes under one roof.

Flockmasters from the province and Ontario will be in keen competition for the sheep money. A large entry of Oxford has been received from Peter Arkell & Sons, of Teeswater, Ont. James Jones, the well known Alberta breeder will also be in this class. Leicester will be shown by H. Smith of Camrose. Cotswolds and Southdowns are being brought up by Sam Donaldson & Sons, of Noval, Ontario, while Johnston Brothers of Langdon, has also a number of Southdowns. Shropshires and Hampshires are being brought up by Archie McEwen, of Brantford, Ont., and H. W. Watkin, Olds; Thomas Stewart, G. K. Allenby & Sons, Calgary. The quality of the eastern stock will increase interest in sheep classes. The karakul sheep which are to be on exhibition will also form an interesting feature.

Hogs are looked on with a great deal more favor by farmers and breeders generally now than they were a year or so ago. Good prices and the prospects of an abundance of feed again will return them to favor. There are a number of shipments coming in from the eastern breeders for the exhibition. Sam Dolson & Sons, who are bringing up sheep are also entering in the classes for Tamworths and Berkshires, and Belgium.

William Gilbert, of Stony Plain, will be a competitor in these classes. Hamley & Sons, of Munson; Jos. H. Laycock, Okotoks; Steve Swift, Viking, and others will be competitors in many of the strong classes. O. Miller, of Strathmore, and J. W. Bailey & Sons, of Wetaskiwin, two of the most prominent breeders of duroc jerseys will give splendid competition for this breed.

An appropriate military flavor is to be imparted to the entertainment at the Calgary Industrial exhibition this year, by several features of a most interesting character. "The March of the Alps" will show soldiers representing all the nations engaged on our side of the struggle who will be appropriately and correctly uniformed. They will march from their camp, to the inspiring strains of the massed bands up to the saluting point in front of the grand stand. 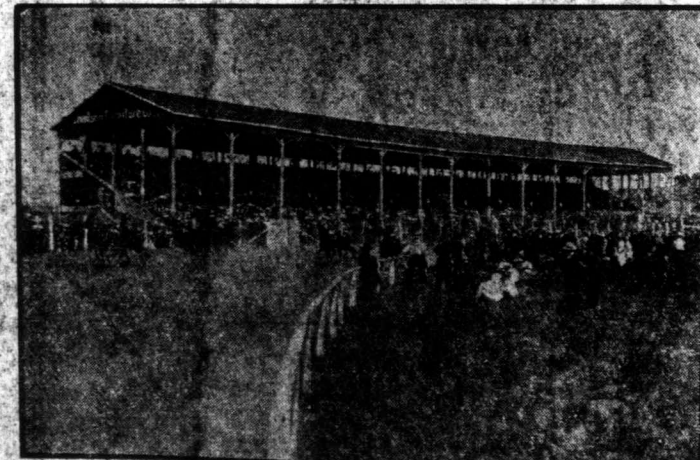
As guides to explain the trenches to the interested spectators will be returned veterans who have by dearly bought experience learned all there is to know about them.

In the big industrial building there will be a display of munitions made in Canada which are supplied to our armies at the front. This will show every process of manufactures, and in one instance there will be a shell in thirteen stages of development, from the rough piece of iron right through until there is a shell cut showing the shrapnel in its case all ready to have the ignition fuse applied to it and send it speeding on its death-dealing way.

Arousing the interest and sustaining the enthusiasm of an exhibition audience is one of the most difficult problems that confront those in charge of the big fairs. The crowd is extremely critical, and nerves get ragged with the bustle and jam of scurrying pleasure-seekers, and when seats are reached the moment of relaxation is succeeded by critical inspection and a tendency to "knock."

Attraction programs that would pass muster at any of the big vaudeville houses, where people pay good money to secure seats, are frequently picked to pieces when introduced at an exhibition.

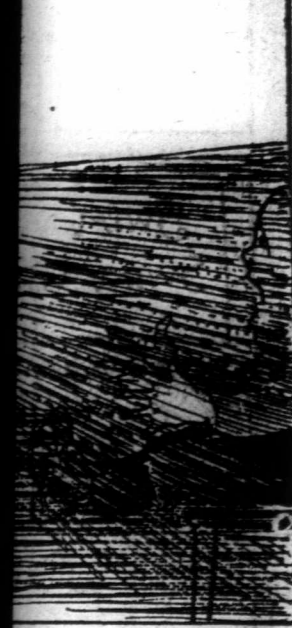
