Little Paragraphs of Sport From Far and Near. The negroes of Galveston, Texas, held a mass meeting Sunday and appointed committees and sub-committees to arrange for a big parade and reception to honor the American Bowling Congress meet. Dell Gray and Carl Cramer, of Jamestown, N. Y., put up 981 in the doubles. Gray putting up a poor series, while Cramer rolled steadily. In the singles Cramer got 491 and Gray 471. None of those scores will have a chance at the money. The Blue Ribbons of Buffalo went on in the late squad of five with representatives of eight other States and Canada.
