Austrians Routed In Italy

20,000 Drowned in Piave River-50,000 Taken Prisoners-Austrian Losses Enormous

The Austrian army, which about the middle of June crossed the Piave river to drive the Italians further 23rd driven back to the east bank with great losses in men and guns. The enemy had hoped to put Italy out of the war. The Italians claim 50,000 prisoners, and that 20,000

Austrians were drowned in the river.

The lull on the western front has
continued nearly a fortnight, indicating heavy german losses in their
last drive there. The American troops stationed in the Belleau Wood, northwest of Chateau Thierry, France, followed up their recent attack as a result of which they occupied the wood in its entirely, and have advanced their positions materially northwest of the wood and made prisoners of 264 of the enemy in addition to inflicting heavy losses in men killed and wounded
