POLES AND WIRES DOWN.—By the fogata we learn that in the storm of Monday evening and night 70 poles were blown down between Westville and Brookfield, B.B., in a distance of 3 miles. Some of the poles with the weight of wet snow on them and on the wires sunk two feet in the ground. Many of the Anglo-American Telegraph Co.'s poles are down between Westville and Brookfield, and gangs of men are effecting repairs.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Nov. 22.—Dr. Hawley H. Crippen will be hanged at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning. This announcement was made to-day, and with it passed any hope that the condemned man may have of an evening hour delay. The gruesome details incident to the office of the executioner have been worked out and the usual care of British criminal procedure taken to guard against any hitch at the last moment. From the time his wife, Bell Elmore, the actress, disappeared, up to the day of his conviction, public sentiment against Crippen grew stronger, but in his last hours the condemned man is not without sympathy. Clara Ethel Le Neve, the woman for whom Crippen killed his wife, has continued her visits to his cell. There are others who shake their heads and declare that they would never convict a man on circumstantial evidence. From expressions in the papers and the gossip of the street, it is plain that no other murder case of recent years has taken such a hold upon the feelings of all classes.

Special Evening Telegram.
TULSA, Russia, Nov. 22.—Through-out the night and during the early hours of the morning special trains arrived at Jatzelska, the railway station near Yasnaya Poliana estate, bearing delegations to the funeral of Count Leo Tolstoy. Students from Moscow occupied 25 coaches. Following Tolstoy's wishes, request his grave had been made under poverty oak, in the spot where, in childhood, he buried a green rocking horse. This reference was to an episode in the early life of Tolstoy and his brother, who with childish rites consigned to the earth a hobby horse in the belief that when it was disinterred a reign of happiness would be inaugurated. The novelist often referred to the disposition of his body, and in directions left specified explicitly that the ceremony incident should be one of the simplest kind without the rites of the orthodox Greek Church.

The special train bringing the body from Astapova arrived at the Zaslavsk station at 8 o'clock this morning. The funeral party was met by throngs of mourning peasants, who since the death had been wending their way there from the surrounding countryside. According to Russian custom Tolstoy's sons formed the party of bearers and bore the casket on their shoulders over the two miles separating the station from the novelist's home at Yasnaya Poliana. The route was through a small wood, across gradually sloping fields, and through the wooded part of the estate to the house. The way was lined with mourners. Peasants marched at the head of the procession carrying white banners, inscribed "Leo Nikolaevitch the memory of your goodness will never fade from the minds of us orphaned peasants." Following the peasants were two students' choirs chanting memorial hymns and four carriages filled with wreaths. There came the sons, trudging slowly under the weight of the casket. The Countess and others of the family followed the funeral afoot. Arriving at the house the cortege halted and the casket was borne within and placed upon a catafalque in the author's favorite room. This had been empty of its furniture and was barren, except for the cherished book case, a portrait of Tolstoy's brother and a bust of Buddha. The body lay in state. The public was freely admitted to the room, and for several hours an unbroken line passed reverently by. The interment was deferred until late in the afternoon.

OWNED BY A SYRIAN.—The schr. Elsie B. lost Monday night at St. John's. It is owned by Mr. Kelly a Syrian, who formerly did business in St. John's. As far as can be ascertained, the vessel and cargo are insured.

SCHR. RESCUE O. K.—We learn to-day from the Belvidere that the schr. Rescue, alluded to in another column, is all right and is safe at anchor in St. Mary's Harbor. She is bound from Paradise to this port laden for Jas. Baird, Ltd.

CARDIFF, Wales, Nov. 22.—The disorders in connection with the strike by the Welsh miners in the Rhondda Valley are becoming serious. The rioters have attacked the houses of the mine officials, held up and searched trains, storming the signal boxes and keeping the signalmen prisoners; while this was going on, and have threatened other outrages. There was a fierce conflict last night between rioters and the police at Tonypandy which was not quelled until the troops were summoned. Several policemen were severely injured.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—A strike of 1,000 building trades union members employed in the new White Hall building in sympathy with a walk-out of sheet metal workers has been called. Leaders of the union say the call is only the beginning of a general strike of all building trades workers which will involve fully 100,000 men unless their demands are granted.
