Schooner Cut Down.

The Port de Grave schooner Pilot, John Butler, master, coming from that place to St. John's, was cut down by the schr. Samuel R. Crane, Mercer, master, of Bay Roberts last to some mismanagement, she crashed into the starboard side of the Pilot, breaking the rail, bulwarks and stanchions from the fore chains to the quarter deck except in one place, about three feet wide, where the main but neither of them would handle deck near the fore chains.
