Damages to Piers

The highest tide witnessed in the harbor for many years prevails to-day, and several wharves were flooded, the waves going completely over them in some instances. The head of the eastern King's pier has been partly demolished and at Harvey & Co's. steamboat premises during the early morning when the tide was highest much damage was done. The water swept up under the breastwork near the fish store where Mr. J. E. Savage is in charge, and also forced its way up under the flooring of the cargo sheds starting planks and stringers and threatening to damage freight stored there. Mr. H. Bartlett, however, with Mr. C. Godden, employed a big crew of longshoremen and they soon had the goods removed to a dry and more secure part of the premises and they suffered no damage. A veritable sea, swept in between Harvey & Co's. easternmost shed and Harvey's premises, tore away the shores in on Harvey's breastwork and some of those under the side of the sheds, the ground being carried away by the water and quite a hole was formed there. A lot of freight which had been placed there had to be quickly removed. Men are to-day engaged putting beams and stringers under the side of the shed on its easternmost side to strengthen it, and several piers exhibit the damage which the sea has caused. The Stephano and other steamers are still in the stream and from the former not a package of

cargo has yet been taken out of her. Yesterday Mr. Bartlett and others went out to the ship in Bowring's launch and brought the luggage of the passengers ashore.

The Storm Universal.

To-day barometers in the City show a steadily falling glass and it looks as if we have not yet seen the worst of the snow storm now raging. From Pogo, Lark H., and other ports, messages to the Marine & Fisheries Department indicate that the storm prevails all over the island and news in from Halifax shows that a blizzard is also raging in the provinces. The country roads are becoming quickly blocked and few people have entered the city to-day coming from the suburbs.

Secret Correspondence

Between Turkey and England Disappears from Constantinople and Believed to Have Fallen Into the Hands of Foreign Power.
London, Dec. 30.—The Evening Standard prints a story to the effect that secret correspondence between Turkey and England in regard to the Sullum district of Tripoli has disappeared. The correspondence disappeared from the Foreign Office at Constantinople.

Investigation has shown that the secret papers have fallen into the hands of a foreign power.
As a result of the investigation, two officers of the foreign department of Turkey have been arrested and several have fled from the country. The Sullum district in Tripoli was ceded to Egypt and in effect to England pending the settlement of the status of the territory after the conclusion of the Turco-Italian war. The announcement of Turkey's action in giving the territory was announced a few days ago.

Tried to Strangle Himself.

When he sobered up a bit he detached his suspenders from his pants and placing them around his throat he took the ends in his hands, and when Furlong discovered him he was in a fair way of choking himself to death. His face was discolored and his breath gone, and but for the prompt action of Furlong and Sergt. Savage the man might have succeeded in committing suicide. They quickly pinioned his arms, took the braces from around his neck and later had to confine him in a straight jacket, so violent did he become, while Const. Brown was detailed to watch him all night. He was before the court to-day and was remanded for 8 days.

Brother Drank the Fatal Dose

Philadelphia, Dec. 28.—Wm. Wilt, thirty-three years of age, was found dead in his home early here to-day from poison which had been prepared by his brother, John, one year older, who had intended to kill himself.
John Wilt felt so good yesterday over having passed an examination to become a registered plumber that he started to celebrate his triumph by drinking. Towards evening he became remorseful and on his way home purchased fifteen cents worth of whisky and ten cents worth of carbolic acid. He mixed the liquids and when he got home took a swallow and went to his room.

During the night his brother was found dead on the dining-room floor by their mother. Hearing moans coming from John's room an investigation showed that John was suffering from poison and he was rushed to a hospital, where after he had recovered from the effects of the poison he told what he had done.

It is the theory of the coroner that when William Wilt came home he saw the poisoned whisky on the dining-room table and took a drink, dying before he could leave the room.
