The Passing of Gen. Booth.

Sixty years a young man of twenty-three became a minister of the Methodist New Connection Church who was destined to become one of the greatest spiritual powers and social workers of the age. Young in years he was by no means inexperienced in the work he was undertaking. He was educated at Nottingham by a private theological tutor of the Methodist New Connection Church and commenced at the age of 15 to preach in the open air at Nottingham. After his entry in the Ministry he became a travelling evangelist of his church and was called upon after a time to settle down to regular circuit work. In 1871 he resigned to take up evangelistic labours. When he came to London he was much affected by the social and spiritual destitution of the East End and determined to make special efforts to relieve it. To do so, on July 5th, 1865, he instituted the Christian Mission and some thirteen years later changed its name to the Salvation Army. This institution has since grown into a world wide power, working for the uplift of humanity.

The Salvation Army has some 26,000 officers at work in some 56 countries and colonies. These are at work in connection with 8,972 corps, circles and societies. Perhaps the feature which has attracted the greatest sympathy among outsiders is its social work among the submerged, whether from accidents of fortune or from vicious surrounding. In this connection some 900 institutions are helping the starving, down-trodden, and criminal. Beds were supplied during twelve months to some 6,327,249 and meals during the same period to 11,839,437. These figures show the enormous activities of the institutions which have been set going and fostered by the great man who passed to his rest on Tuesday night.

Not the plaudits of the multitude, not the recognition of the august and high, not even the universal tribute to his work constitute his title to fame, but the work he has done, and the institutions he has established, and the memory of a great heart beating for humanity directed by a wise head will be his enduring monument of fame. A work like his which has gained such a hold on the world cannot die. It is true a crucial test must be gone through now that the great head has been removed. But even this may be less than many supposed. His son, Mr. W. Bramwell Booth, who succeeds him has been Chief of Staff for the past thirty-two years, and who knows yet that he may have been to the Salvation Army, to use an Army simile, what Lord Kitchener as Chief of Staff was to Lord Roberts as Commander in Chief in South Africa. Mr. Bramwell Booth's experience as Chief Officer of the Executive has been a long one, some 32 years in duration. If training and experience go for anything, then no man could be fitter for the position which has been bequeathed to him than Bramwell Booth.

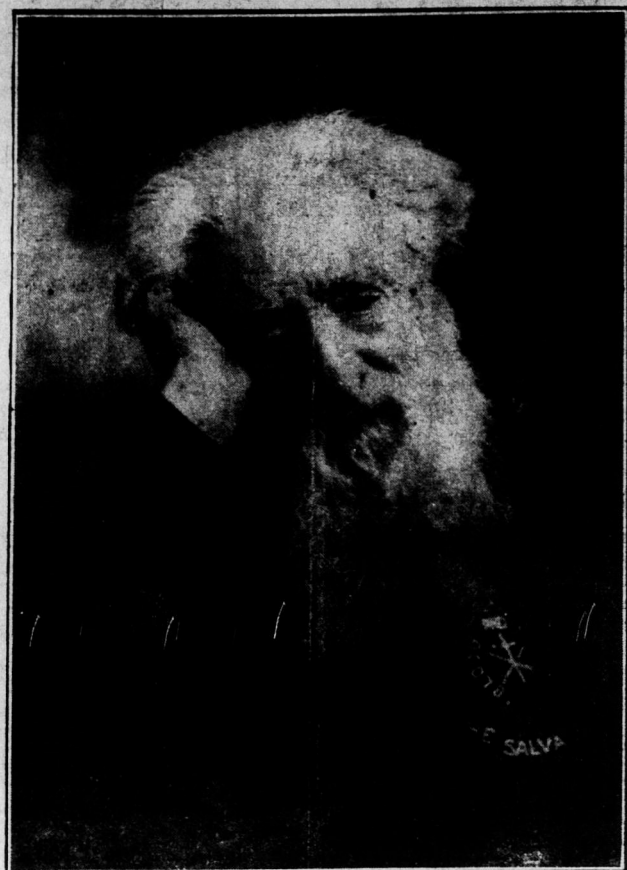

GENERAL BOOTH IS DEAD



The Late General Booth.

Died at 10.40 Tuesday Night

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Aug. 21.

General Booth died at 10.20 last night. He was unconscious for 48 hours previous to his death, and received the unremitting attention of his son Bramwell and Mrs. Booth. Public interest centres in the question of his successor, who was nominated by the General several years ago, his name being placed in a sealed envelope and deposited with the Salvation Army's lawyer, to be opened after his death. It is generally believed that it will be Bramwell Booth, for 30 years chief of the staff. Where the General will be buried is not decided, but whilst it is generally considered that no man is more worthy of interment in Westminster Abbey, it is not expected that the honour will be accorded, and it is thought that the General's last resting place will be by his wife, who, 21 years ago, was buried in Abbey Park Cemetery, Stoke Newington.

Flags of the Salvation Army headquarters throughout the country are half-masted. Despatches have been received at headquarters from Kings and royalty, and cablegrams from countries as remote as Patagonia and Lapland. The lying-in-state will take place at the S. A. Congress Hall at Clapton, where the body will remain for a week.

LONDON, To-day.

In the presence of all the Salvation Army commissioners and the principal officers in London at the International headquarters, General Booth's testament, entrusted to the Army's solicitor, twenty-two years ago, was opened and read. By it, he appointed his son, Bramwell, to succeed him. Mr. Bramwell Booth has been the chief of staff since 1880. The late General Booth will be buried on August 29th, at Abbey Park Cemetery, at Stoke Newington, where his wife lies buried. King George was one of the first who telegraphed condolences. Messages were also received from Premier Asquith, the Archbishop of Canterbury, and other prelates of the church, the Lord Mayor of London and many others, including representatives of all Protestant creeds and from prominent persons of the Jewish faith.

Cadet History in the Making of Boys of Empire.

The first great Inter-Dominion Review and Competition in the history of the Cadet movement is the ambitious undertaking of the Canadian National Exhibition this year.

The suggestion came from Earl Grey. Recognizing the fact that the influence of the Exhibition was not only national but fast verging into the Imperial, the then Governor-General conceived the idea of bringing boy soldiers from every dominion of the Empire on which the sun never sets, and lining them up for review before his royal successor.

A Big Undertaking. The magnitude of the undertaking would have appalled any body of men except the directors of the Canadian National Exhibition. They got right down to work on the suggestion. The leaders in the cadet

movement in Canada were interested, the Militia Department at Ottawa lent their assistance and the Imperial authorities, realizing the value of the undertaking as an empire binder, turned a helping hand.

From all Dominions.

To-day the far-reaching undertaking is an accomplished fact. Not only are cadets coming from England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, New Zealand, Australia and Newfoundland, but Eton College is sending a corps and the city of London, England, another. The Dominion Government is sending a corps from each province, while Upper Canada, Ridley and St. Andrews colleges will be represented and the Highland Cadet Corps of Montreal are coming in their full force of one hundred strong. In addition to this, about twenty corps from Ontario have been invited, so that in all over forty corps will be encamped in the model camp on the grounds, while fully five thousand will line up before the Duke of Connaught on Review Day.

The model military camp to the west of the Transportation Building will this year be indeed an interesting spot. It will be the home during the entire Exhibition of the cadets from all parts of the Empire, all the provinces of Canada and all parts of

Ontario. The boys will be under military discipline while in camp and will follow the regular camp routine of a regiment of soldiers.

The Competitions.

The competitions which will carry with them world's championships will be divided into three classes as follows:

1st.—Physical drill.
 2nd.—Marching, manual exercises and general appearance.
 3rd.—Shooting.

King Gives Prize.

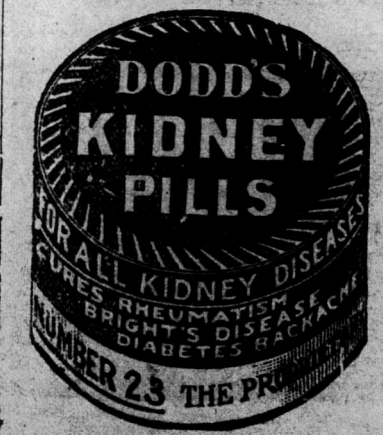
His Majesty King George has signified his approval of the movement by donating a shield for the company shooting competition. This shield will stand as a challenge trophy to be competed for annually and will be to the Cadets of the Empire what the King's Prize at Bisley is to the militia. Lord Roberts has donated gold and silver medals for the champion shot and the runner-up, while Earl Grey is giving a medal for the best drilled company. The Duke of Connaught will review the Cadets on Tuesday afternoon, August 27th.—Canadian National Herald.
