In Passing.

The Pall Mall Gazette gives a process of preserving fish fresh without the use of ice in its transport. The fish is placed in a cooling chamber at about freezing point for two hours to take out the latent heat. It is then placed for four hours in a tank of sea-water, fortified by 15 per cent of salt to prevent the water freezing which is kept at 21 degrees below the freezing point. The water is kept in motion by an electric fan and the anxious gasses absorbed by charcoal. The fish thus treated is said to be impervious to decay from a week to a fortnight.

Sir Robert Bond was in town yesterday. He is looking well, and is in fine fettle. He will be able to give a good account of himself at the forthcoming session of the House of Assembly. Before the Christmas of next year people are expecting to see him in charge of the Government.

Supreme Court.

IN CHAMBERS.
(Before Mr. Justice Johnson.)

In the Matter of the Petition of Robt. Moors, Jr., of Twillingate, Fisherman, Praying to be Declared Insolvent.

McNettly, for petitioner, is heard, and puts in evidence taken before W. J. Scott, J. P. at Twillingate, and moves that the petitioner be declared insolvent, and for the petitioner's costs to be paid out of the estate. It is ordered that there be added to the assets interest in the Estate of the Petitioner's father, John Moors, late of Back Harbour, Twillingate, as by his will appears.

The value of the interest is at present unascertainable as it depends upon conditions yet to be complied with. Under these circumstances let petitioner be declared insolvent and Wm. Ashbourne be confirmed as trustee, and costs allowed at \$15 including cash paid.

The police say that Prince has four times been under suspicion of having done murder. In each case the police found witnesses by whom they expected to send Prince to the electric chair, but when the grand jury was ready to hear the evidence, the witnesses were strangely missing. The police believe that several of them were murdered. Prince's name had long been a by-word in the Italian colony.
