Light and Power.

Our Civic Commissioners no doubt
have done some good during the past
year they have reigned and judging
by the surplus which they announced
some weeks ago, they have been able
to direct the expenditure in more
economical channels.But the 'esprit de corps' that you
will find in hundreds of offices along
Water Street and which is not found
in political cliques when Railway
Arbitrations are going, seems to be
also lacking in the Council when it is
necessary to 'Bonus' so many officials
not for Regular work, but for Special
work.In a merchant's office when there is
anything of a special nature doing,
every clerk takes it as a matter of
course that night work is necessary
and this they do for their master's
benefit—"for the good of the voyage,"
as the old agreement runs.And surely with how much more in-
terest should work be undertaken by
Government and City Council when
the aim is improvement to the Colony
or to the City. But it is a weakness
peculiar to all public institutions and
scarcely anyone can resist the tempta-
tion to take all the remuneration and
more that is coming to them when it
is taken from everybody's money,
which they consider after all is
nobody's money.There is one matter which I hope
will find a prominent place in the re-
commendation, which the Commissionwill present to the Government very
shortly, and that is the question of
Electric Light and Power for the City.The present and only dispensers of
electric current have a lovely field to
themselves and it presents many
temptations, to one of which they
have already yielded, the result being
that the local factories are now facing
a large increase in the price of Pow-
er. But they can do nothing but
grin and bear it. Is the Electrical
Co. prompted by Patriotism? Will
someone please answer.Compared with other cities our cost
of Electric Light is far higher and at
any moment it may be raised higher
still. And we can do nothing?Mr. Commissioner, it is up to you.
We commend you for starting lab-
our breaking up stone and we want
you to go a step farther. We want
the city to own an Electrical Plant
that will not only save the present
householders who use it dollars every
year but will permit the thousands of
houses still without it to use it and
create a Revenue of Profit for the
city that will enable you to pay for
the labour of paving Duckworth
Street or pay for any other necessary
improvement you desire.It needs courage. Will you do it?
