### Nfld. Aeroplanes Presented.

The Newfoundland Aeroplanes were formally presented to the Royal Park Flying Corps yesterday, at the anniversary of the entrance of Britain into the war on August 4th, 1914. The movement was suggested by the Patriotic Association, and when the committee to deal with the matter was formed, it was decided to raise money for two aeroplanes, if possible two of the large Gnome-Vickers bi-planes. This was supplemented by an aeroplane paid for by Messrs. W. D. Reid, H. D. Reid and R. G. Reid. The idea was to raise the money quickly so that they could be presented on August 4th. This has been done, and a message was received yesterday by His Excellency the Governor acknowledging the gift. The acknowledgment is as follows:

"Newfoundland's gifts have been announced in this morning's Times, Morning Post and other Journals. Please transmit to the Patriotic Association our most grateful thanks for the munificent gift of a further Gnome-Vickers bi-plane. The Chief Inspector of the Royal Park Flying Corps writes:—'I note with pleasure the new addition to the Aircraft Fleet, through the generosity of Newfoundland and the Messrs. Reid. An writing fully.'"

It was evident a week ago that not only would sufficient money be in hand to do what the Committee set out to do, but that there would be a surplus. There was also a strong disposition to present also a number of machine guns, and it was decided to continue the appeal with a view to utilizing this surplus to purchase machine guns. This surplus which is large together with the offers of machine guns will place the Machine Gun Fund in a good position, and we have no doubt that there will soon be sufficient money in hand to purchase quite a number of them. The number will depend on the cost which has not yet been definitely ascertained, but it is thought to be about \$750. The idea is to present thirty. The response to these appeals has been magnificent and prompt.

### Lt. Jackson Wounded.

On Tuesday night last Mr. John Jackson received a message from the War Office informing him that his son, Lt. A. M. Jackson, of the Royal Engineers, had been wounded during an engagement on August 1st, and that further particulars would be cabled when received.

On receipt of the message Mr. Jackson sent a cable to Mrs. Jackson who is now in London, asking for further information and in reply was informed that her son was not seriously wounded and that he was in hospital in France suffering from a flesh wound in the thigh.

Lt. Jackson spent a four days furlough in London during the last week of June, having been in the trenches since January last. It is presumed that he was injured during Sunday's fighting at Hooge where the enemy with the aid of asphyxiating gases and flame projectors put up a desperate fight.

The many friends of Lt. Jackson will be pleased to learn that his injuries are not serious, and we hope that his recovery will be a speedy one.

### British Theatre.

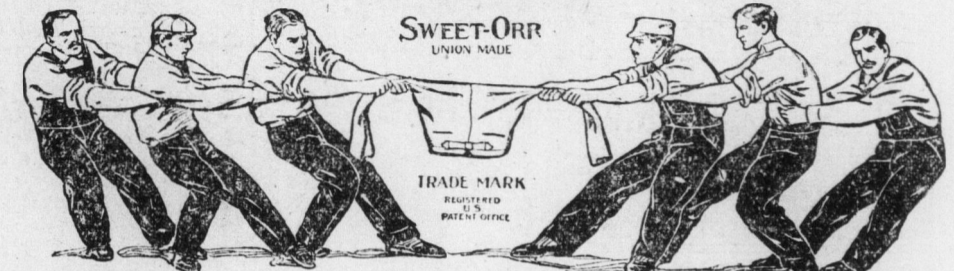
