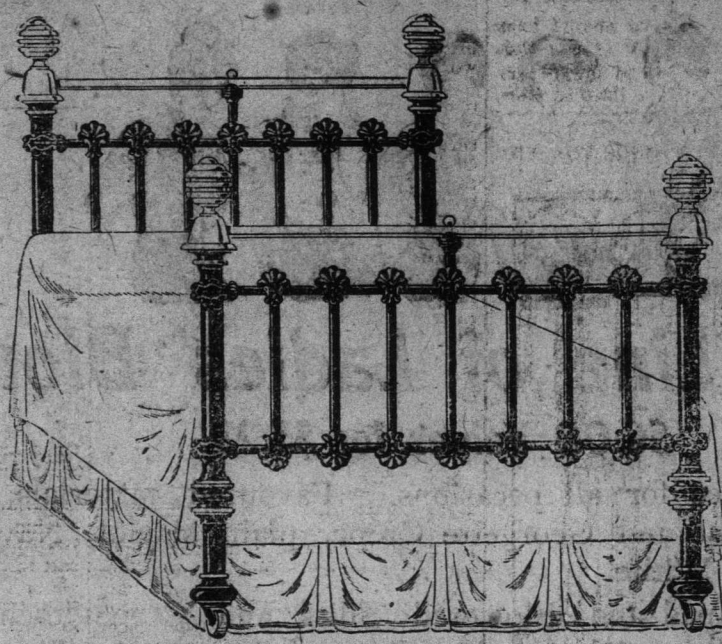

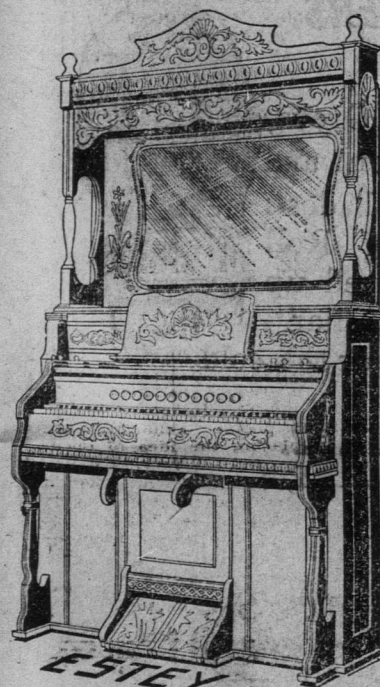

Relief Subscriptions

To Territory in Occupation of the
Enemy

21st October, 1916.
Editor Evening Telegram:
Sir, I beg to enclose herewith
copies of Code Telegram No. 554, of
date 17th instant, received by His Ex-
cellency the Governor from the Sec-
retary of State for the Colonies, with
respect to the subject of subscriptions,
collections or remittances for Relief
Societies operating in enemy occupied
territory.

This matter is one of public inter-
est, and I shall be glad, therefore, if
you can arrange to give this telegram
space in your columns.

Code Telegram from Secretary of
State, (Received October 17, 1916).

Desirable that it should be laid
down that general subscriptions, col-
lections or remittances for Relief So-
cieties operating in enemy occupied
territory should not be encouraged.
This does not apply to National Com-
mittee-relief of Belgium which stands
on special footing, but does apply to
Polish relief and therefore excludes
committee. Subscriptions made with
a view to Polish relief are only for re-
lief of Poles in Russia and should be
sent through H. M. Ambassador, St.
Petersburg or if preferred through
Polish War Victims Relief Committee
in London. Remittances to individ-
uals in enemy occupied territory not
being of enemy nationality may be
allowed provided conditions laid down
in dispatch sent by mail are fulfilled
briefly. Firstly, same individual not
to receive from all sources more than
£25 per month. Secondly, all remit-
tances to be made through Bank in
United Kingdom which can be super-
vised by H. M. Government.

Household Notes.

Mushrooms are most delicious when
allowed to simmer in their own juice
and a good amount of butter.
Powdered sugar always makes a
lighter cake than granulated sugar.
A few drops of liquid sodamint in
hot water will sometimes relieve the
baby's colic.
Stains can often be removed from
clothing with ease and no rubbing if
the stains are rinsed out in warm
water, then well rubbed with
a good soap and allowed to soak in
boiling water for an hour.

Little muslin bags filled with oat-
meal and left in the water pitcher
overnight are excellent for softening
the water. Let an oatmeal bag re-
main in a basin of hot water for a few
minutes, and it will take all the
hardness away.
To keep celery for a week or even
longer, first roll it up in brown paper,
then in a towel, and put it into a dark,
cool place. Before preparing it for
the table put into a pan of cold water
and let it remain there for an hour to
make it crisp and cool.
People who constantly wear furs
should keep a little diluted lemon
juice in a small bottle on the wash-
stand, and apply to the neck every
night. This will prevent the forma-
tion of the black marks which so often
mar the beauty of the neck.
