EARLY MESSAGES

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Feb. 21. (Official.)—Yesterday our advance of Jerusalem was resumed despite heavy rainstorms and moving through difficult country in which the enemy offered obstinate resistance.

Progress made progress to the extent of three and one-half miles on a line of about seven and three-quarters miles within four miles of the city. At the same time our line advanced to the northwest of Jerusalem in the sector west of the Jerusalem-Nabulus road to a maximum depth of one mile on a front of 15 miles. Co-operating with this our air service made effective attacks against enemy depots on the left bank of the Jordan about Shunet-Nimrin, ten and a half miles east-northeast of the city. Our losses in the operations yesterday were very slight. Those of yesterday have not yet been reported. The operations are continuing.

GOOD FIGHTING WEATHER.

British Headquarters in France, Feb. 21. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—Great patrol raiding and aerial activity constitute the only news during the present period of waiting for the Germans to begin their attack. The weather continues wonderfully fine and along the greater part of the front the condition of the ground is good enough to permit offensive operations on a large scale feasible. The correspondent heard a dozen reports yesterday that the German effort had begun both in the north and south and also that the Franco-Americans had taken the offensive. These and like rumors will probably be repeated daily. From Passchendaele to our southern flank we are everywhere ready to meet whatever is coming.

GERMAN OFFICIAL.

BERLIN, Feb. 21. (Official.)—Eastern War Theatre. Group of General von Erhardt's regiments from Moon Island landed on the frozen Sound and into Esthonia and occupied the town of Narva. In the march along the Gulf of Bothnia through Pernig and Lemnava was fighting for a short time in which 500 prisoners were taken. Our troops march through Wenden and are now pressing eastward.

INTERIM REPORT OF ROYAL COMMISSION.

Melbourne, Australia, Feb. 21. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—An interim report of the Royal Commission on the administration of the Defence Department pays tribute to the labors of the department, but recommends the immediate remedying of the fundamental defects of the general system. It estimates the value of the excess stocks of boots and clothing for the Australian forces at £1,250,000. It recommends the reconsideration of the policy of extensively shipping military clothing from Australia to elsewhere and considers the formation of a permanent army ordnance corps imperative. Hon. Mr. Pearce, Minister of Defence, replying to the criticisms of the department, refers to the rapid and enormous expansion of the Defence Department and the difficulties regarding the estimated requirements. He admits temporarily overstocking on two occasions beyond his control.

Complaint from Bell Island.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—As you are aware there is at present there an epidemic of smallpox—(so called)—on Bell Island. In order to guard in every way possible against the spreading of the disease it has been found necessary (and justly so) to close Public Places of all descriptions on the Island, this including also the W. P. A. Sewing Classes. Personally I was notified authoritatively at 5.15 on Friday evening last (February 15th) that orders had been issued for the "Nickel" here to "close down" on Saturday night. My reply was: "If orders have come to close down I will do so at once"; however I was told that it was not necessary and that Saturday night would be time enough. Therefore in compliance with the law and in order to assist the authorities in every way to confine the dread disease, I locked the "Nickel" doors at 7 o'clock on Friday night. Most of (if not all) the schools are closed, and, as I understand it, those which are not closed at his time of writing will be closed during the present week, and furthermore that the Churches will also be closed. All this is as it should be at a time like this. But why in the name of common sense the Rink is allowed to be kept open is something which neither myself nor others can understand. I have enquired about this but all the satisfaction I can get is "the Rink—(don't you know)—is mostly an 'open air place'—(the card and tea rooms are warm and comfortable, however). Even so it is hardly possible that smallpox germs must of necessity carry thermometers around with them in order to find out just what temperature they require to enable them to work successfully. The real reason is that there is undoubtedly a big difference between a 'wage-earner' and one holding a salaried 'position' as I was further informed that the people who frequented the Rink were (shades of De Brott) of a different class 'to those who went to the 'Nickel'." Although it may not be generally known there is a very high percentage of "Blue Blood" on Bell Island and the probability is that before long we may have a "Society column" in the "Bell Island Miner." What I am anxious to know is why the line should be drawn between two places of amusement? One of which caters to the public in general and a few "Blue bloods" (and the other which "entertains" a few Blue bloods (?) and the general public. If it is Law to close one it surely must be Law to close the other; if not why single out the "Nickel"? Perhaps it interferes with the "Rink Revenue." The enemy showed considerable activity during the day in the neighborhood of St. Quentin and the Arras-Cambrai road, south and west of Lens, south of Armentieres and east of Ypres.

INDIAN CHIEF RECEIVED BY THE KING.

LONDON, Feb. 21. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The King received in audience at Buckingham Palace, Lieut. Lost of the Canadian Forestry Corps, Chief of the Six Nations Tribe of Indians, Ontario, who brought over a number of his braves and intends to return to Canada and recruit more of them for forestry work in France.

MONEY WANTED.

LONDON, Feb. 21. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—Rt. Hon. A. Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in a circular letter says: "I have once more, on behalf of the Government, to ask the people of this country to place their financial resources at the disposal of the State in order that we may have the means to carry on the war to a successful conclusion. Last year I made a similar appeal and the unprecedented success of the war have afforded overwhelming proof to both the Allies and the enemies that the people of Great Britain are united in their determination to do their duty in the struggle for liberty and justice which Prussian arrogance forced upon the world. At this moment it is more imperative than ever that we at home should do our part in support of the great cause for which these dear to us are fighting and suffering. The result of the week to week borrowing has hitherto been most encouraging and I am confident you all will save all you can and deposit money direct with the state by buying national war bonds."

TROTZKY WILL PROBABLY RESIGN.

LONDON, Feb. 21. The Daily News correspondent at Petrograd telegraphs that Trotzky will probably resign.

ALFONSO HAS PEOPLE'S SUPPORT.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. Official despatches from Madrid received at the Spanish Embassy today telling of demonstrations, accompanying the transfer of the colors of the old military academy from the Royal Palace to the Museum of Infantry at Toledo, are interpreted as renewed evidence of the solidarity of the army in its support of King Alfonso, the government and the entire sympathy of the Spanish people as well. Official despatches describe the demonstration as having a very significant importance.
