Code Telegram from Secretary of State:

(Received 7th November, 1919.) I am commanded by H. M. the King to send you for immediate publication the following message which is addressed to all the peoples of the Empire. "TO ALL MY PEOPLE,-

"Tuesday next, November 11th, is the first anniversary of the armistice which staved the world wide carnage of the four preceding years and marked the victory of right and free. dom. I believe that my people in every part of the Empire fervently wish to perpetuate the memory of that great deliverence and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it.

"To afford an opportunity for the universal expression of this feeling, it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the armistice came into force, the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, there might be for the brief space of two minutes a comolete suspension of all our normal activities. During that time, except in the rare cases where this might be impraccicable, all work, all sound and all locomotion should cease so that in perfect stillness the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead.

given signal, which could easily be arranged to suit the circumstances of each locality, I believe that we shall all gladly interrupt our business and pleasure, whatever it may be, and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

This will be published in the press here to-morrow morning. Arrangements are being made for the general observance of the two minutes' silence at eleven o'clock next Tuesday. Trains will be stopped on the railways, traffic on the streets, ships as far as possible at sea, and every effort will be made to get work suspended everywhere, in schools, shops, mines and factories and to ensure complete silence. His Majesty hopes that your Ministers may be willing to arrange for a sim-

It is, of course, impracticable owing to distance, that the ceremony should synchronise throughout the Empire. It is therefore suggested that eleven a.m. local time should be adopted everywhere. Similar mes sage is being sent to India and to every Dominion and Colony in the Empire.






