## Attled With Huge Caribou.

ONE TRAVELLER ATTACKED BY STAG.

Mr. Ronnie J. MacDonald, the once famous Marathon runner, who is now a travelling salesman at Port au Port, Newfoundland, tells of a thrilling experience a patient of his underwent recently.

The man, Mark Gibbons, was passing through the country settlement of St. John's Crossing, at dawn on October 15, when he was attacked by a huge caribou, who had been pursuing him for some time.

Knowing the fighting methods of the animal, Gibbons dodged the brute, caught him by the antlers and being a powerful man, endeavored to fight him. Several times the man was down for a moment and time and again he had to get up.

On these occasions he tried to escape, but was pursued and forced to defend himself again.

A high fence was near Gibbons and he tried to save himself by jumping over it. The stag, however, leaped the fence more easily, and the man was forced to give up this method of escape. Finally Gibbons went down in an almost exhausted condition, feeling that the end was near.

At this moment, however, a young hunter charged the stag driving him to the side of the caribou. In the confusion that followed the man made his escape to a nearby farm.

Here he secured a rifle and returned. At the sight of him the stag charged again, and Gibbons fired. It took two bullets to kill the animal, who dropped at the feet of the intended victim.

The stag weighed five hundred pounds. This is the first time in the history of the country that a caribou has attacked a man without cause, such as at this season they sometimes do when wounded and cornered.

Dr. MacDonald attended Gibbons, finding him exhausted and badly bruised. He has since recovered.

## Western Notes.

Several small business men at Port au Port and St. John's, holders of codfish of less than one hundred quintals made sales at Sydney and North Sydney at prices which brought them out on the wrong side of the ledger, the actual loss between purchase and sale being \$150. Naturally these men are not exactly blessing the Fish Regulations.

Capt. John H. Pike, of Channel, with a serious accident some time ago. While going out the harbor in his motor boat, in some way he came in contact with the propeller of the fish wheel, which cut the flesh from his foot. At first it was thought that the bone was injured, but examination proved contrary, though the wound was severe one, necessitating a lay up for nearly two weeks.

Mr. Small, M.H.A., for Burgeo & Pike, was in Channel a fortnight ago, and we learn that his reception was not so enthusiastic as last fall, presented the appearance of being considerably worried, and doubtless his concern was not artificial as every person was onto him about the Fish Regulations, though a great deal of either information

or satisfaction was secured. Obviously Coaker has all the minor legislators under his thumb.

There is no improvement in the fishery situation about Channel, Port aux Basques and vicinity, and to make matters worse, work on the terminal improvements at the Reid wharf is slackening. A number of men engaged in excavating have been laid off. The bulk of employment is now being put into the completion of freight shed, station and customs office, all of which may be ready by the middle of next month. Men from outside places have been brought in, taking the places of residents, and there is great dissatisfaction over this new move on the part of the Railway Commission.

Capt. Fred Martin and crew recently returned from Sydney by s.s. Kyle, having sold their vessel at Burgeo, from which place they journeyed home via New York.

## To-Day's Messages.

DON'T WANT WILLIAM.

PARIS, Nov. 22. The Greek Legation here issued a denial, this evening, of reports that the former German Emperor would be installed on the Island of Corfu. Legation officials said there was no foundation for the story.

## LABRADOR BOUNDARY SETTLED.

LONDON, Nov. 22. Signatures of the Canadian Attorney General and Newfoundland Attorney General are at last signed to an agreement settling the long standing boundary dispute between Canada and Newfoundland sent to the Privy Council in London for settlement. It will be a year, however, before the case is definitely settled, according to Warren, Newfoundland Attorney General, who with C. J. Doherty for Canada signed the agreement in London. "It is a case of most historical importance," declared Warren, who has been in London three months preparing Newfoundland's claim. "Almost invaluable wealth in water power, forests and minerals is in dispute, and the territory makes the possession there a question of tremendous commercial significance."

## SMALL CRAFT NEGOTIATES ATLANTIC CROSSING.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22. A thrilling tale of the fury of the sea, as viewed and fought from the deck of a thirty-five foot schooner, was told here to-night by Captain Wm. Washburn Nutting, as he brought his trim little craft "Tippoon" safely to her Staten Island mooring. He made fast the line and vessel had completed an eight thousand mile voyage across the Atlantic and returned. In her long haul, which started from Baddeck, N.S., on July 18, "Tippoon" visited Cowes, England, during the International Motor Boat Regatta, proceeded to French and Spanish ports, and left Corunna, Spain, on the return trip, September 15. She stopped at the Azores, "Tippoon" ran into several storms, and several times Captain Nutting said she barely emerged safely. On one occasion she ran into a heavy cross sea, and lost her mizen mast and food supply. For three days the party lived on hard tack and water. Later a Spanish steamship was hailed and the latter replenished.

## THE LEAGUE AND ARMENIA.

GENEVA, Nov. 22. Speaking to-day on resolutions demanding the intervention in Armenia by League of Nations, and supporting Lord Robert Cecil's demand that the Assembly appoint a committee to examine into means for ending hostilities between Turkish Nationalists and Armenians, M. Spalekovich of the Serbian delegation, recalled that United States Senate at one time had approved the use of United States fleet to succor Armenians. It was recalled that Senator Harding, was the Senator who supported the resolution. A. J. Balfour, of Great Britain, speaking on the resolution, said that if United States had been willing to take a mandate for Armenia, she had men, money and spirit to make her an ideal mandatory. The League has been unable to accomplish anything with regard to the Armenian situation, Balfour admitted, because the condition of Armenia, he argued, was not such as the League was organized to deal with. Balfour said an appeal must be sent to forty-one States of the League for a combined effort to save Armenia. Rena Viviani of France, following Balfour said, all were agreed that compassion would no longer suffice for Armenia.

## Supreme Court.

(Yesterday.)  
Before Mr. Justice Kent.

In the matter of the petition of T. C. Morgan, of Springdale, general dealer, is insolvent, and praying that he be so declared. Mr. Hunt appears for petitioner; Mr. Tait appears for alleged insolvent. Wm. C. Morgan is sworn and examined. Mr. Hunt moves that Wm. C. Morgan be declared insolvent and that Chas. H. Butt be appointed trustee, and the cost of the application be taxed and allowed.

In the matter of the petition of J. J. Rossitor, general dealer, alleging that C. W. Johnson, of St. John's, baker, is insolvent, and praying that he be so declared. Chas. W. Johnson is recalled and re-examined by Mr. Gibbs, K.C. It is ordered that the debtor be declared insolvent, and that the cost of the petition be allowed. Mr. Gibbs, K.C., moves that the insolvent be charged under the penal proceedings of the insolvency statute. Mr. Haller, for the insolvent, opposed the motion. It is directed that the usual form be followed. Mr. Pnsent moves for attaching creditors' costs. Mr. Hunt opposes. The further hearing is adjourned until Thursday, the 26th inst., at 10.30 a.m.

In the matter of the Judicature Act and Annie Power, adm. of M. Power, vs. Andrew Murphy, et al.—Mr. Mews moves that permission be granted to strike out paragraph 1 of the petitioner's claim. Mr. Hunt, for

the debt, consents. It is allowed in the usual form.
