She stopped at the Azores. "Tippoon" ran into several storms, and several times Captain Nutting said she harely emerged safely. On one she barely emerged safely. On one occasion she ran into a heavy cross sea, and lost her mizzen mast and food supply. For three days the party lived on hard tack and water. 
