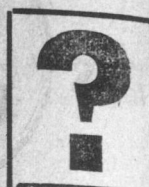

Hr. Grace Will Come Into Its Own Again

**When the Bennett Government
is Elected.**

The proud and delightful old city of Hr. Grace, the second in point of importance in the Island, is determined to come into its own again when the Bennett Government is elected. With the return of prosperity to the whole Island by the free development of our fisheries, and by the encouragement of many large industrial enterprises which capitalists will be induced to undertake when a stable Government is installed. Conception Bay will be sharers in all these benefits of progress and therefore its Capital City, Hr. Grace, will likewise participate. Once the pride and glory of its people, and a city the admiration of all visitors, years of depression, under Coakerism particularly, have left a sad impression on it, and its people, along with those of other parts of the Country, have had to endure disastrous privations. Declining fishery pursuits have caused business to be disastrous there, and consequently much want of employment has brought to the families of all classes great privation and much suffering. A continuance of such conditions would so affect Harbour Grace that it would only be a

matter of a very short time when what still remains to the city would decay more, and reduce this beautiful and once prosperous city to the level of a mere dilapidated village. One by one its remaining business establishments would drop out of sight, its remaining local industries would suffer so from want of an outlet for their output and those too, would disappear and deprive of employment all those depending thereon. Property holders would find their all in all gradually losing the value of their interests in same, every man who could possibly find means to do so would quickly depart therefrom, for all its girls and boys would one by one leave the old homesteads to seek the living that a still further depressed city would be unable to provide for, and so, where prosperity, hives of industries, increasing population and contented families should reign under a Bennett Government in Hr. Grace, there would exist a city of decay, peopled merely by aged people whose loved ones would be scattered over Canada and United States seeking but merely an existence for themselves. That there would be a boom in all manner of in-

dustries beneficial alike to Hr. Grace as well as St. John's, and around the whole Island, the moment the Bennett Government is endorsed at the polls, is the continued opinion of all men of experience in financial, commercial and industrial circles. That further stagnation and the consequent driving of all wage earners from their home towns and villages to other countries, and much suffering and increased unbearable taxation for those left at home, is the opinion of the same reliable authorities, if the Coaker-Squires combination is returned to power. On the one hand, therefore, there lies before the people of Hr. Grace the road to prosperity and the revival of the old town to the days of its historic importance, to a future where its inhabitants will thrive in comfort and build up an even greater degree of improvement; a city of homes where the old people will be happy for the remaining years of their lives, and where the young may remain with them to add to their pleasure, and comfort those whom they cherish. On the other hand they see the road to ruin and desolation, to the wrecking of their home and families, to the parting of the young from the old and the dilapidation in general of this once historic city. With the outlook before them, prosperity on the one side, and ruination on the other, it would be insulting the intelligence of the voters there to ask which they will take, for but one answer could be made and that will be pronounced on election day in the straight ticket vote for Bennett, Hickman and Archibald.

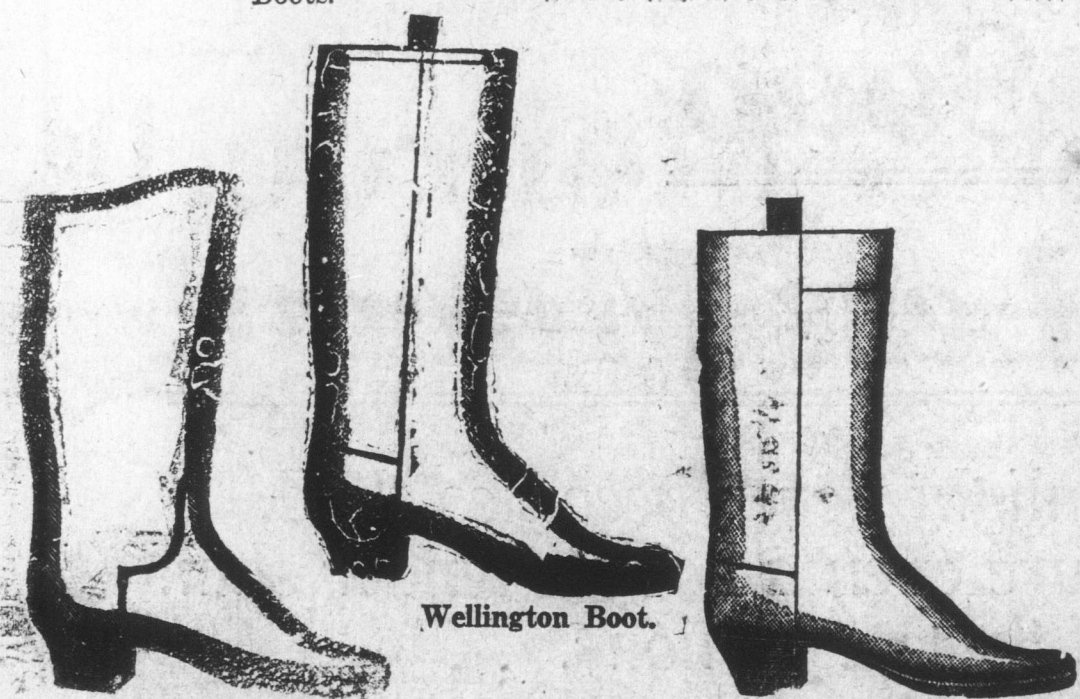
