**Harbor Grace Notes**

On Wednesday afternoon last, a fire at a barn owned by H. H. Archibald, near his residence, on Bannerman Street. The congregation of the United Church were having a Garden Party at Shannon Park on that day, and soon after the alarm had been sent out, numbers who had gathered at the Park, flocked to the scene of the fire. It had soon made great headway and it was greatly feared that the Masonic Hall, Coughlin Hall and the nearby residences would catch from the sparks and flanks that were flying around. However, the firemen and a number of citizens worked well, and thus prevented the fire from spreading. Some of the contents of the barn, including a motor car, carts, wheels, slides and harness were saved, but some five tons of hay, which had been put in only a short time previously, together with the barn, was completely destroyed. The loss is estimated by the owner at about three thousand dollars and there was no insurance. The origin of the fire is not known.

Early Thursday, the fire alarm again rang out, and this time a fire was in progress on board the S.S. Pawnee, which was lying at the Public Wharf Victoria Street. The firemen and some citizens were quickly on the scene and had two streams of water at their command. It was found that the cook's stateroom below deck and just off the saloon, was on fire. There was some difficulty at first in getting the right location, but when discovered, the fire was soon stopped. The ship left at her scheduled time on her run to Bell Island and Portugal Cove.

A Garden Party was held in Shannon Park on Wednesday afternoon by the congregation of the United Church and proved to be very successful. The weather was fine, and a large number were in attendance. Delicious meat teas were served by the ladies, while candy, ice cream, and drinks were also on sale. A good sports program had been arranged, but was only partially completed owing to the serious fire which broke out in town. The committee was arranging a 10-mile road race, between Mr. Joseph Martin, a local man, and Mr. Jack Bell, of St. John's, but it had to be cancelled owing to Mr. Martin's leaving here on Tuesday. **MARKET LETTER**

(From Our Boston Correspondent)

The bull market continues to set new records. It shows the utmost disregard of the opinions of those who comment on a miscellaneous collection of adverse factors. A very high level of prices, record broker's loans, a large business volume and sharp upward movements accompanied by imaginative talk on the part of pool manipulators are among the things enumerated as reminiscent of the culminating phase of bull markets. The importance of such things is, of course, relative, and must be considered in terms of other prevailing conditions. Things which are recognized as phenomena of a stock market situation which is unhealthy may appear long before the end of an upward movement is imminent. As a matter of fact, most of the things currently receiving comment as indicative of the approaching end of a bull market have been present to some extent since last Fall.

After the rise which has occurred it is natural for stock market diagnosticians to search for indications of a bear market. But are we to ignore the combination of easy money, record building activity, full employment of the major industries, record earnings in many lines of trade, recovery of the agricultural sections and many other favorable factors and turn bullish because of high brokers' loans and other phenomena, the relative importance of which no one is qualified to estimate? No one can say with finality that, before this market terminates, brokers' loans will not be very much larger, that prices will not be much higher, that business will not be much more active or that upward movements will not be much sharper.

We can't have a bear market unless people are willing to sell stocks. We know that the public are cheerful and would rather buy than sell. It is not public selling which ends bull markets, however. It is liquidation by so-called insiders—people of large financial resources—who take advantage of general optimism to dispose of large blocks of stocks. Their selling increases the floating supply of stock to an amount greater than public purchasing power can take care of and a decline ensues. But important interests do not dispose of stocks without good and sufficient reason.

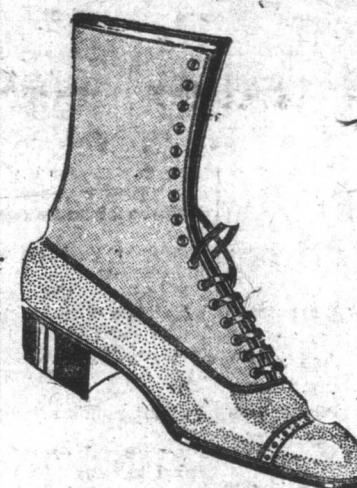
