

Australian Government Sustained and Liberal Factor Wiped Out

Lady Astor Urges Abolition of Submarines
 --British Parliament Reassembles To-day--Terrific Gales During Week End on Canadian and U. S. Coasts.

SATURDAY ELECTION DAY IN AUSTRALIA.
 MELBOURNE, Nov. 14. Intense interest is manifested throughout the Australian Commonwealth in the outcome of general elections being held to-day. A record poll is assured owing to the system of compulsory voting. Premier Bruce, head of the Coalition Government, composed of the Nationalists of the country party, expressed assurance that the Government would be re-elected. Former Premier Hughes said the new Parliament would be either "a thing of beauty and joy forever, or a thing which the very devils in hell would spit at."

FIRST ELECTION RETURNS.
 MELBOURNE (Reuter) Nov. 15. Forecast, based on Australian election returns up to an early hour Nov. 15th, give 36 seats to the Government, and 23 to Labor in the new Parliament. Ex-Premier Hughes was re-elected.

AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT RETURNED WITH INCREASED MAJORITY.
 MELBOURNE, Australia, Nov. 15. General election throughout Australia, precipitated by the seamen's strike, resulted in the return of Nationalist County Coalition Party with increased majority and complete wipe out of Liberal representation, which was four in the last House.

NO HOPE FOR BRITISH SUBMARINE.
 LONDON, Nov. 14. The British submarine, imprisoned 68 of crew, still remained in an unknown spot under the turbulent waters of the English Channel, and all hopes are abandoned for the rescue of officers and men aboard. The Admiralty has been unable to verify the report that the submarine was located on the bottom twelve miles off Star Point, declaring that the bulk discovered there may be any of the numerous wrecks that strew the floor of the Channel.

SCARE STUFF.
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 15. Families in thousands will run the risk of wholesale apoplexy if they attempt to use bituminous coal as a substitute for anthracite during present suspensions in the anthracite field, according to a warning issued by John L. Lewis, international president of the United Mine Workers of America.

LLOYD'S SUPPORT APPEAL TO ABOLISH SUBMARINES.
 LONDON, Nov. 15. The proposal made by British delegates at Washington Conference on

limitation of arms for the abolition of submarines has been revived by the public statement from Percy MacKinnon, Chairman of Lloyd's, as a result of the M-1 disaster. "The appeal was made after consultation with Lloyd's Committee in the hope that such a great marine institution would be able to arouse public interest."

LADY ASTOR WOULD CARRY THE APPEAL ROUND THE WORLD.
 PLYMOUTH, Nov. 15. In a speech here to-day Lady Astor urged all women of all countries to unite in the demand for the abolition of submarines and poisonous gas. She declared herself ready to go around the world in an effort to arouse all women on this question. While she did not urge total disarmament she believed submarines should go.

POLICE RAID DUBLIN HOUSES.
 DUBLIN, Nov. 14. Under the authority of the recently passed Treason Act, which makes it illegal to maintain any military organization, the police to-day raided one hundred houses in Dublin, seizing a quantity of Republican literature and maps, and making arrests. Only two prisoners were arraigned, the others were released. Similar searches are being made throughout Ireland.

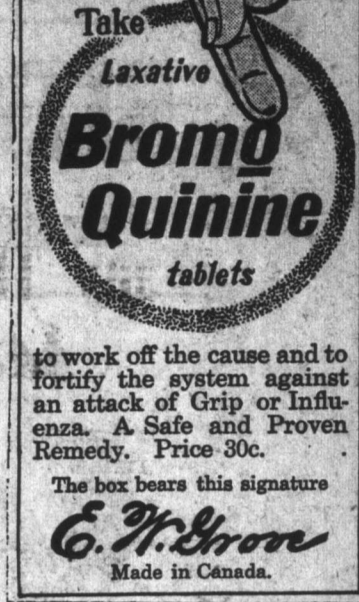
EVACUATE COLOGNE BY DEC. 1.
 PARIS, Nov. 15. Cologne area will be evacuated by December 1, according to a decision reached by the Allied Council of Ambassadors to-day.

PORTUGAL TO NEGOTIATE LIQUIDATION OF WAR DEBTS.
 LISBON, Nov. 14. The Portuguese Government has decided to appoint three delegates to negotiate liquidation of its war debt to Great Britain.

NEW ENGLAND STORM TOSSED.
 BOSTON, Nov. 14. Two dead, many injured and property damage on land and sea was the result of a southerly gale that was abating to-day after lashing New England for 24 hours. Ample warning gave snipping opportunity to seek shelter, but the schooner Northern Light became a total wreck on the rocks at Rockland, Maine, and a coast-guard boat went ashore on Martha's vineyard. Two men were electrocuted when fixing wires blown down by the storm.

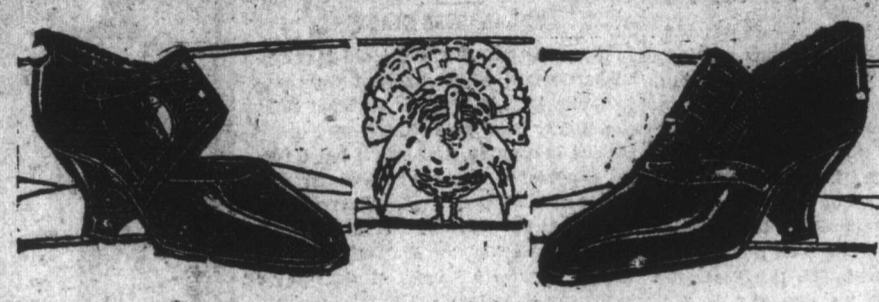
