We have carefully and studiously read over the address delivered by His Excellency, the Lieutenant-Governor, on the opening of the Parliament yesterday, and do not hesitate to pronounce it a document infinitely superior to the generality of addresses hitherto delivered on similar occasions. There is evidence of great care having been bestowed upon its preparation, by a mind fully competent to the task. Reference is made to the continued prosperity of our noble Dominion, since the con summation of Confederation, which had the effect of forever burying the many grevious differences existing between the upper and lower sections of this Province. When we recollect how strenuously Upper Canadians demanded representation by population, and failing in this Dissolution of the Union, and how bitterly Lower Canadians denied us the boon, we may well rejoice with the people and with His Excellency to find that by the Act of Confederation these and other difficulties have been settled, and we now work hand in hand for the advancement of our beloved Dominion. Although we admit that full justice was not done Upper Canada by this Act, yet we accepted it, and have no cause to regret our having done so. en the upper and lower section

Reference is also made to the fact that we have now the administration of our local affairs in our own hands, and, consequently, our revenue has enabled us to accumulate a surplus of over four million of dollars. When we consider the large amount of money spent in aiding our new rail way enterprises, the establishment of homes for the poor and the afflicted, and other public works and improvements, we have cause to congratulate ourselves upon the fiealthy state of our linances. We feel that we have a Government now at the helm whose wise administration will continue to guide the ship of state with wisdom and ability.

The debts owing to the Municipal Loan Fund, no doubt, will require serious consideration in order that one portion of the Province may not suffer at the expense of the other. We are glad to find that IIs Excellency's attention has been directed to the Lenefts arising from the drainage of swamp and wet lands in different parts of the Province, and trust that our legislators will give the subject that attention-which its importance adenands.
