Queen's Counsel.

It will be rembered by our readers what a long and warm dispute took place between the Dominion Government and the Ontario Legislature as to the right to appoint Queen's Counsel. In consequence of this dispute, and to set the matter at rest, a correspondence took place between the Minister of Justice and Colonial Office on the subject, all of which has been laid on the table ; and we learn from it first, that the Governor-General has the power, as Her-Majesty's representpower, as Her-Majesty's representative, to appoint Queen's Counsel; second, that a Lieutenant-Governor appointed since the union has also such power: but, third, that the Legislature of a Province can conferby statue on its Lieutenant-Governor the power of appointing Queen's Counsel, and, with respect to precedence or pre-audience in the Courts of the Province, has power to decide as between Queen's Counsel appointed by the Governor-General and the Lieutenant Governor, as above explained.

The Minister of Justice, under date September 28th, 1872, calls attention to the appointment made in the Province of Ontario by the Lieu tenant Governor, and expresses grave doubts as to the validity of such appointment. He mentions that by the law of Upper Canada, Queen's Counsel can, in certain cases, perform certain judicial duties; and recommends, under the circumstances, that commissions be issued by the Canadian Government to such of those gentlemen as wish to receive them.

This document is followed by a despatch from the Ontario Government, dated Oct. 25, 1872, which refers to the extraordinary private circular sent to the newly appointed Queen's Counsel by the Minister of Justice; and expresses regret that the Government of Canada had not seen fit to transmit a copy of the opinion of the law officers of the Crown to the Government of Ontario; and suggesting that before any further action is taken a joint case should be submitted for the decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in England.

The last document of importance is a minute in Council enclosed to the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, which, after alluding to the documents already referred to, concludes as follows:—

'The Committee of the Council do not apprehend that any inconveniences or complications can arise from the Queen's representative exercising the Royal prerogative in making such appointments. It is obvious that when the Supreme Court or other Dommion Courts are established, commissions issued by the Lieutenant-Governors-yould not, as of right, give precedence or position in those Courts. At the same time it might be advisable that such commissions should be recognized. The Committee of Council, are, therefore on the whole, of opinion that his Excellency the Governor-General, as the queen's representative, should not referring from appointing Her Ma. or the whole, of opinion that his Excellency the Governor-General, as the timeen's representative, should not refrain from appointing Her Majesty's Counsel, but they think an arrangement might advantage, ously be made between the Governor ments of the Dominion and the several Provinces by which Queen's Counsel appointed by the Governor General would receive proper status and position in the Provincal Courts, and commissions issued under status tory authority by the Lieutenant Governor would be recognized in the Courts of the Dominion.
