London, Oct. 7th.—At Northampton yosterday ovening, after the declaration of the vate, a mob of Mr. Bradlaugh's supporters attacked with stones the hotel of Mr. Fowler, a Liberal candidate. The police were unable to quell the disturb-ance, and the Riot Act was read. The military had to be called ont, and other assistance summoned. In the struggle which followed, many persons were in-jured. At midnight the town was grow-ing quiet.

A special to the Post says that anarchy A special to the Post says that anarchy reigns in Turkestan. Turcomans are plundcring tribes friendly to Russia, and her armed intervention is inevitable. Holly Springs, Miss., Oct. 6th.—Last night five negro prisoners broke out of gaol here and escaped. One of them, James Peri'ns, under death sentence for murder, struck a guard named Mack Hill on the head with an iron bar, causing his death. To-day the Sheriff re-captured all the prisoners. Hill is a brother of James Hi'l, Serctary of State. The feeling among the colored people is 'such as would render Perkins' life unsafe out-side the gaol.



The Fall Show of the Nassagawga Agricultural Society was held in the field adjoining Mr. M. Lyons' Hotel, Halton-ville, "on Tuesday. Heavy rain had fallen during the night, and in the morn-ing it looked dull and gloomy, no doubt preventing many from coming out, either as exhibitors or visitors. The Show in consequence was not as good as we havo seen it in former years, nor was the at-tendance nearly so large, though it was surprising how many came out, consider-ing the state of the weather and roads. The stock was exhibited in the field in front of the hotel, and the grain, roots, dx., in the Drill Shed. There was not a very large turn out of horses, but 'b brood marce, carriage, bugg and hack horses, the competition was keen, and not a few of the animals were very superior. Some very good thorough-bred cattle were shown, as also grades, but the late untoward easen, and the scarcity of pasture, consequent on the excassive drought, told on them severely, and they are not in such good condition as they would have been under more favourable circumstances. In sheep, however, we saw no falling off, and many of the animals show: would have done oredit to our best farmers or breeders. We have always noticed that the best Nassagaweys farmers are generally noted for their oxeellent sheep. The pigs were also very good. There was about the poorest show of-grain we have seen in Massagawya. Theirs is mainly attributable to the ra-notournable season, which also militated against the production of good butter. The display in this class was not at all up to what we have seen in this Township. It is surprising that the roots were so good. The samples of potaces were numerous, and the size and quality first-class. Turnips were excellent. Fruit, especially in apples and pears, were woll represented, and not a tew samples in both classes would have taken prizes at any of our largest shows. We noticed also some really good, well-grown grapes. The domestic manufactures were not largely represented, but the specimens shown wer shown. There was bread in abundance, of the There was bread in abundance, of the best quality; also some choice specimens of honey, strained and in the comb. Nassagawaya seems to be a favourite haunt of the bees, for good honey is al-ways produced there. The show of implements was the small-est we ever saw in this Township. We notice by the prize list that Mr. M. Lyons made a liberal contribution of \$20 to it, that Mr. Chisholm, M. P., con-tribute \$10, and that Mr. T. J. Day, of Guelph, gave several special prizes.
