First, we wish to emphatically repeat our recommendation of last year, that, in growing corn for ensilage, care should be taken to select the largest variety that will fully mature before frost in the locality where

mature before frost in the locality divided grown.

Special attention is called to the fact that heretofore it has been a common practice to sow or plant corn for fodder and ensilaging, entirely too thick. Starch and sugar are not fully developed without an abundance of sunlight. of sunlight.
