THE VENEZUELA DISPUTE. London, Oct. 1 .- The Chronicle says it has reason to believe that a satisfactory settlement has been arrived at of the Venezuelan question, and that an arbitration treaty is imminent.

DOCKERS' STRIKE SETTLED. London, Oct. 1.-The 500 Hamburg dock laborers who went out on strike on Morday have resumed work, a compromise arrangement favorable to the strikers having been reached. THE AUSTRIAN BUDGET.

Vienna, Oct. 1 .- The Budget for 1897 was presented today in the Lower House of the Reichrath. It provides for expenditures to the amount of 692,161,183 florins. The estimated revenue is 692,703,959 florins. (The Austrian florin is 36 cents.)

DROUGHT IN INDIA. London, Oct. 1 .- A dispatch from Bombay says the drought continues in Northern and Central India, where there has been no rain for many weeks. The crops in those sections have utterly failed, and grain riots have occurred in many places as the result of the scarcity of cereals.

BRITISH REVENUE RETURNS. London, Oct. 1.-The revenue returns for the United Kingdom for the quarter ended yesterday show a decrease of \$1,825,645, compared with the same period of 1895. The decrease was chiefy in excise and customs duties. The returns for the quarter ending June 30 show an increase of \$8,140,250, compared with the same period in 1895.

The proportion of the Bank of England's reserve to liability, which last week was 55.45 per cent, is now 52.14 per cent. The rate of discount remains unchanged, at 3 per cent.

A company of Huussas were surprised by insurgent Fahavolas near Antananariyo recently and several of the former were killed. I'wo officers were wounded. It is also stated that the insurgents attacked and pillaged several convoys. The porters in each instance were killed. It was also rumored when the mail left Madagascar that thousands of Fahavolas had surrounded Antananarivo and attacked the suburbs.

When Nicholas I. visited London and Windsor in 1844 he gave £3,000 (\$15,000) in charities, £3,000 to the servants at Windsor, £3,000 worth of diamonds to the court ladies, twelve gold snuffboxes set in diamonds to the lords, grooms in waiting and equerries, and over 100 watches, brooches, rings and other presents. Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 1.-The great hurricane worked vast damage in this city. The full extent of the losses will not be known for several days. In the business and residence sections not a single building escaped serious damage. Every church, hospital, asylum and school building in the city was more or less damaged. The Savannah, Florida and Western Railway suffered the greatest loss. passenger depot is a total wreck, and six new Pullman cars were badly

damaged. AT LEAST FIFTY LIVES LOST. It is a conservative estimate to say that 50 persons have lost their lives from the hurricane, and the number may run much higher. News comes slowly from that portion of the State where the storm first struck, for wires are down and railroads are impassable. The hurricane struck Florida at Cedar Keys, and reports show that it passed in its path of destruction over twenty towns and villages, and that between 30 and 40 persons have certainly been killed. Cedar Keys, with 1,500 innabitants, is about 100 miles southwest of Jacksonville. The report is that the town has been swept away

and many lives have been lost. Moving northeasterly, the storm struck Williston, a small town, where eleven houses were blown down, one person was killed, and several are believed to be fatally hurt. Near there is a large turpentine farm, where State convicts are employed. Twenty of these were huddled together in a cabin. A heavy tree was blown across the cabin, and six of the conviets were crushed to death. In Gainesville the Methodist Church

and about twenty residences and business houses were destroyed.

At Lacrosse fifteen buildings were destroyed. A clergyman and a mother and her babe are reported killed. Near there four laborers who were in a cabin were crushed by falling trees. Newberry, in West Alachua, is to-tally wrecked. At High Springs, a number of people took refuge in a box car which was in the path of the cyclone. It was blown along the track, and then off it a distance of 50 feet, and every person in it was badly injured. Two have since died. At Gracy, a small place, twelve houses were blown down, a woman

was killed, but a babe at her breast was uninjured. At Lake City eight business houses and thirteen houses were destroyed. county considerable destruction is reported. Five children were killed in teacher had her arm broken.

IN VIRGINIA. Alexandria, Va., Oct. 1.-The storm relativel was more severe in Alexandria than in Vashington. There were four fatalities and three persons more or less injured. The dead are: W. D. Stewart, Mrs. Holt (a visitor from North Carolina), an unknown colored woman, Tillman Diles (colored). The injured are: Lester Corbin, Charles Adams, and Miss Stewart, sister of W D. Stewart. Alexandria churches suffered severely. The First Baptist was completely demolished, St. Elmo Baptist was also wrecked, and Robert's Chapel, M. E., south, lost its spire. Nearly every business block in was more or less damaged, and hundreds of private houses lost their roofs. The loss in and around Alexandria is estimated at \$400,000.

# Disastrous Wreck

On the Baltimore and Ohio Railway,

One Man Dead, Two Dying and Several Missing.

Pittsburg, Pa., Oct. 1.-Two freight trains collided last night at Philson, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railway, 124 miles east of Pittsburg, making one of the worst wrecks in the history of the road. One man is dead, two are fatally injured, and several others are missing. The latter are doubtless lying dead under the wreck. Details of the wreck are meager and difficult to procure. The storm has left telegraph lines in a terrible condition. The property loss to the railway company was very heavy.

# WORK AND WAGES

The Masons' Strike at Windsor Not Yet Settled.

Windsor, Oct. 1.-The strike of masons and bricklayers in the employ of George A. Goodman threatens to be much more serious than at first expected. The other unions have promised to support the strikers. The 'longshoremen propose to put every obstacle in the way of Goodman's unloading stone sent to him by boat, and the strike will probably extend to the other buildings for which he has contracted. Goodman offered to discharge the Detroit masons if the unior could supply him with twelve good Windsor men, but it came out that there were only seven masons in the union, and that two of these had steady work in Walkerville. When the Windsor men absolutely refused to go back to work, he hired anybody he could get, and now he has twelve masons at work, two of whom do not belong to any union.
