ZIM STILL WINNING.

LEICESTER, Aug. 16.—Zimmerman won the five mile international bicycle race; Barker 2, Edwards 3. Time, 11:51 2-5.

A GREAT RACE.

The relay bicycle race from Washington to Denver was completely successful in all respects. The distance over the entire course is 2,037 miles. The original schedule required the trip to be made in eight days, or at the rate of five minutes and 43 seconds to the mile for the whole distance.

The start was made from Washington at noon Monday, Aug. 6. The riders reached Denver at 10:40 Sunday night, 1 day, 9 hours and 20 minutes ahead of time. The actual time made was a mile in 4 minutes and 43 seconds and a fraction, or almost one minute less than schedule time.

This is the most remarkable bicycling performance in sporting history. It is the longest run ever made on bicycles. It included all kinds of roads, up and down mountain declivities, across and through rivers, across the arid plains, along all kinds of highways and byways, and in all kinds of weather. Some of the riders suffered from nearly 100 degrees of heat, and one of the bold riders, between Julesburg and Cheyenne, was buffeted and drenched by a waterpout. One or two lost their way in the cactus deserts this side of Denver.

SCOTLAND'S FAST RIDER.

Dan Hodge, Stirling's champion cyclist, has worthily upheld the honor of Scotland in the international matches with England and Ireland, and according to O'Neill, the crack Irish rider, Hodge is the fastest man at present on the Scottish path.

FIVE WORLD'S RECORDS SMASHED.

DENVER, Col., Aug. 16.—Five world's records knocked out was the result of the national meet of the L. A. W. today on the Denver Wheel Club's new one-third mile track.

Clyde Turnbull, of Denver, obliterated the novice record of 2:29 and put up 2:23 3-5 in its place.

Then Art Brown, of Cleveland, shaved Sanger's mile competition record of 2:12 3-5 to 2:10 3-5.

Titus took the five-mile national championship in 12:19 1-5, lowering his own record of 12:28.

The half mile national championship went to Eddie Bald, of Buffalo, in 1:05 1-5, just 4-5 seconds under the best previous competition half mile.

Lee Richardson, of Chicago, who wears a gold medal for the fastest half mile ever ridden backwards—2:37 3-5—went for his previous mark and brought the figures down to 2:35. Chairman Raymond, of the league racing board, was referee.

SPOKES.

Mr. J. J. Foot was at the Sarnia meet, and secured the entries of Messrs. H. Davidson, H. D. McKellar and several others for the meet here on Aug. 29.

W. L. Stimmler and Fred C. Euhram, of the Ramble Bicycle Club, of Buffalo, have broken the 200-mile road record. Their time over the course between Buffalo and Erie and return is 15:50:30. The best time previously made over the same course was 17:05, and the record over the Springfield-Boston course was 17:28.

H. L. Stanwood, of the Illinois Cycling Club, Chicago, who is trying to lower the Chicago-New York record of 10 days, 4 hours and 39 minutes, passed through Westfield, New York, at 10:55 yesterday. He reports himself well and expects to make the journey in about eight days from the start. He traveled 144 miles Tuesday.

THE CRACKS HAVE A TUMBLE.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Aug. 16.—Four thousand people went to the driving park this evening to see the champion of maidens, the trotter measure her worth beside the great son of Halford in the special race for \$3,000, and later to see Robert J strive to lower his own record of 2:05 1/2 and the track record of 2:06 left by Johnson. The first heat in which Robert J. and Fantasy took part served its purpose as a warming-up heat. The two traveled the circuit like a team and went under the wire nose to nose in 2:10 flat.

It was when Fantasy made her magnificent performance that the grand stand trembled with the applause of the thousands. The maiden took the word on the second score down and flew to the quarter in 33 seconds flat, Robert J. urging her on by hanging at her wheel all the way. The half was reached in 1:04 1/2, and then it was known that she would do it. At the half she began her star work, and reached the three-quarter pole in 1:36 1/2, and reached the finish with a magnificent burst of speed, which carried her under the wire in 2:04 1/2.

Robert J. came out for his race against time with Geers up and with a running mate to set the pace. On the word the gelding fairly flew to the quarter 30 1/2, and went on like a streak to the half in 1:01 1/2.

From here he fairly out-raced his mate, passing the quarter post in 1:33, and going under the wire in 2:04 1/2, lowering his record by a full second. There is no question but that he would have done better if his mate had forced him. In the other two events of the day the favorites won and the talent went home happy.

The Political Arena.

The Windsor Conservatives Go Back on the P. P. A.

Brantford's Council Will Meet Mr. Laurier on His Arrival There.

Movements of the Patrons of Industry Ligar Conservatives in Canada.

The P. P. A. supporters in Windsor are rather hot today, and there is considerable talk about a great bolt from the Conservatives in Essex, if the influence of the P. P. A. can bring this about. The trouble started among the Young Conservatives of Windsor when an attempt was made several weeks ago to organize a local club. Several prominent members of the P. P. A. were among the number who urged the organization of the club, and this fact caused a rumour in the very first meeting. An attempt was made by the semi-Catholic members of the new club to pass a resolution which would force the members to take a decided stand either against or for the P. P. A., and there was a hard and long fight in the meeting. The attempt was followed by the introduction of a clause in the by-laws making it obligatory for members of the Young Conservative Club of Windsor to repudiate the P. P. A. and other political organizations. The meeting of the club Tuesday night was a hot one in every respect, and when the new by-laws came up for adoption everyone looked for trouble. The majority of the sympathy was against the P. P. A. members, and when the amendment, which had been introduced as a strike against the anti-Catholic members, was read as a portion of the new laws, the pot began to boil. There was a sharp discussion, and the matter forced to a vote. The ballots were 19 for and 4 against the amendment. The section proposing to become a member must declare that he is not a member of any other political organization for objects inconsistent with the declared platform and policy of the Conservative party of Canada.

The depth of the meaning is more significant to the members of the P. P. A. than is seen on the face, and practically says that local sentiment, so far as is represented by the new club, is against the life of the organization. Several prominent members of the Conservative party are also members of the P. P. A., and the action will cause a bitter feeling. [St. Thomas Journal.

MR. LAURIER AT BRANTFORD.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—The House foreign affairs committee agreed today to report the following joint resolution congratulating the Republic of Hawaii:

"Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the United States of America congratulate the Republic of Hawaii on the peaceful assumption of the power, duties and responsibilities of such Government as is indicated by the recent adoption of a republican form of government."
