BLAZE IN CHICAGO

Several Firemen Injured—Property Loss Estimated at \$550,000.
Chicago, Jan. 26.—Fire of a mysterious origin destroyed the big wholesale glassware and crockery store of Pitkin & Brooks, Lake and State streets, early this morning, causing a loss of \$550,000 and injuring several firemen. The latter were hurt by falling glassware, or were scorched by flames, which suddenly burst from the windows.
The fire was first discovered in the rear part of the second story, and had evidently been burning slowly some time. Adjacent buildings, though seriously threatened, were saved.
In front of the Pitkin & Brooks building is the Union elevated loop railway, which was damaged somewhat by the intense heat. The loss on the building is \$550,000, on stock \$500,000; all were insured. The firm of Pitkin & Brooks is one of the oldest in Chicago.

POLITICAL POINTS.

The scrutiny into the votes of the North Bruce election, the first stage in the hearing of the protest against the return of Mr. Alex. McNeill, resulted in a tie. Both sides will endeavor to prove corrupt practices, in order to cut off votes from their opponents, but the result is practically certain to be a new election.

EXCHANGE OF COURTESIES

Between King Edward and Emperor William Gives the Keenest Satisfaction.

Arrangements for the Queen's Funeral—Order of Procession—Memorial Services Held in All the Churches Throughout the Empire Yesterday—The Kaiser Receiving Birthday Congratulations.

London, Jan. 28.—All the morning papers comment with keen satisfaction upon the exchange of courtesies between King Edward VII. and Emperor William.

"History is being made with lightning speed in these days," say the Daily Telegraph, "days crowded with majestic and epoch-making incidents which can never cease to impress the imagination of the world, and perhaps to affect its fortunes."
"There is not a single Briton but cherishes the hope and the confidence that the close and moving contact into which Emperor William and British people have been brought will result in the absolute removal of a great misunderstanding."

A BRILLIANT FUNCTION.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, Jan. 28.—The crown prince of Germany, Frederick William, was invested with the Order of the Garter this morning by King Edward VII. The investiture occurred in the council chamber of Osborne House. It was a brilliant function. The high officers of the household, military and civil functionaries, and the emperor's entourage, including a party from the imperial yacht Hohenzollern, were present in full uniform.

MEMORIAL SERVICES.

Yesterday throughout the kingdom all places of worship held services in memory of Queen Victoria. At St. Paul's Cathedral there was an unusual scene. Before 9 o'clock in the morning an enormous crowd, wholly attired in black, streamed from all directions to the vast edifice, and by 10 o'clock it was packed. Thousands, unable to obtain admission, stood vainly waiting on the steps and around listening to the low organ strains and muffled peal. The service began at half-past ten. The Most Rev. Frederick Temple, Primate and Archbishop of Canterbury, preached a most touching sermon.

There was a similar scene at Westminster Abbey, where all the services throughout the day were attended by enormous congregations.
The large assemblage in the Chapel Royal, at St. James' Palace, included Princess Frederica of Hanover, Prince Francis of Teck, a host of titled people, many members of the Cabinet and other distinguished persons.
All the Roman Catholic and foreign churches in London held special memorial services. The members of the French Embassy attended the French Church, and very elaborate services were held at the chapel of the Russian Embassy by command of Emperor Nicholas.

Everywhere particular attention was paid to the musical portion of the service. For instance, at Lincoln's Inn Chapel, Brahms' "Requiem" was performed. The venerable William Macdonald Sinclair, archbishop of Canterbury, preached a commemorative discourse at Canterbury Cathedral. Special sermons were preached in St. George's Chapel at Windsor.
Everywhere cathedrals and churches were draped and hung with mourning emblems. Telegrams from the colonies and from all the principal cities abroad, the hymns being sung by an unsupplied choir of school children. Sir Walter Parratt, private organist to the late Queen and organist to St. George's Chapel Royal, Windsor, played several funeral excerpts. The Bishop of Winchester, who was the preacher for the occasion, delivered an eloquent panegyric upon Victoria, and declared that Emperor William's action in coming to her deathbed had touched the hearts of the English people and cemented the unity and friendship of the two kindred nations. At the conclusion of the service all stood during a performance of the Dead March.

The Kaiser's Birthday.

After the memorial service in Whippingham Church, Cowes, Sunday, Emperor William and the Crown Prince went direct to the Hohenzollern, receiving a salute of 21 guns. His majesty took luncheon there, the guests, including Lord Kintore, Col. Carrington, who is attached to his majesty's staff while in England; the members of the British subjects residing in the Crown Prince Frederick William proposed the emperor's health, which was drunk with "Hochs." The Kaiser then drank the health of King Edward, the entire company standing. Then his majesty donned the uniform of a British admiral to receive visitors who might call to tender con-

KING AS CHIEF MOURNER.

The King as chief mourner, accompanied by Emperor William, will ride on horseback, at the head of the procession through London, with Field Earl Roberts, the commander-in-chief of the forces, and staff in close proximity. At least six battalions of infantry, eight squadrons of cavalry and a number of batteries of artillery will participate in the procession, besides the multitudinous assemblage of peers, members of the house of commons and court officials of strange title and stranger garb. The streets will be lined throughout with soldiery, but the route has not been definitely fixed. The coffin-bearers will be non-commissioned officers from the troops composing the household brigade.

ORDER OF THE PROCESSION.

The probable order of the procession is as follows: The Knight marshals men, drummers of the Footguards, the household staff, the judges, privy councillors, peers of the realm, the bishops, the royal crown of Hanover, the imperial crown, the crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the royal body on a gun carriage, the princes of the royal blood, the equestrian and the yeoman of the guard, Units of the army will be interspersed in the column and at its head there will be a firing party. Preceding the cortege military bands will play the Dead March. The standards will all be draped.

ARRANGEMENTS COMPLETED

For Civic Memorial Service at First Methodist Church.

Hour Yet To Be Set—Clergymen Who

Participate—Short Addresses To Be Made.

The committees representing the clerical and ministerial associations met Saturday afternoon, at the Y. M. C. A. and arranged the programme for the civic memorial service. The clergyman making part will be the Bishop of Huron, Rev. Messrs. W. J. Clark, Canon Dann, Dr. Johnston, W. H. Claris and W. M. Walker. Rev. Dr. Smith, pastor of the First Methodist Church, where the service will be held, will preside. As far as possible these are the oldest resident ministers of each denomination in the city. Two short addresses will be made, and the services will include responsive Scripture reading and familiar hymns. Programmes of the complete service will be furnished. The hour of the service will be fixed by the city council, and will probably be early in the afternoon.
The service in St. Paul's Cathedral will be held at 10 o'clock in the morning on the day of the funeral.

CAPTURED THEIR CHIEF.

Henrietta, I. T. Jan. 27.—Deputy Marshal Grant Johnson, and Bunnie McIntosh, of Eau Claire, two men noted for their bravery and daring in hazardous expeditions against outlaws, made a daring capture of the notorious Snake Indians, near Eau Claire, today, and captured Chitto Harjo, Crazy Snake, and he is now held captive under a strong guard of soldiers. The capture of the chief, and the surprising and the show of force which the troops will make will likely put an end to the threatened rising. The Chocowas are quiet.

must fade, but your central figure of the year is visible, being almost hidden by the magnificent white pall and crimson velvet robes of the insignia of the Order of the Garter, the whole being surmounted by a glittering diamond crown, which reflects the lights of the tapers, six feet high, in silver candlesticks. The pall is ten feet long and seven feet wide. In each corner, diagonally, are embroidered the royal arms, surmounted by the crown. The lion is in applique of cloth-of-gold, and the unicorn is in silver, both worked up in silk embroidery. The crowns are in embroidery of silk and gold bullion. The pall was made by the students of the Kensington School of Needlework, under the direction of Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein.

THE QUEEN'S FUNERAL.

Preparations for Queen Victoria's funeral are gradually assuming definite form. It promises to be the most tremendous pageant of the generation. The influx of members of royal families and representatives of foreign countries has been so wholly unprecedented that the court officials are finding it difficult to procure suitable accommodations, the royal palaces being totally inadequate. The procession is expected to occupy two hours, traversing London from Victoria station to Paddington station, whence the funeral train will depart at 11:15 a.m., reaching Windsor at 11:50. The train will be conveyed in the Queen's special saloon carriage, attached to the royal train, built specially for the diamond jubilee, by which
