More Liberal Than It Was in the Year 1891.

Facts From the Circulars Sent Out by the Minister of Agriculture.

An Ottawa dispatch says the minister of agriculture has sent out two circulars to the census commissioners throughout the country. In one of these the minister supmits a statement of the facts under which the payment of commissioners and enumerators is fixed, and quotes the law in regard to it.

In the other Mr. Fisher refers to the circumstances under which special cases of hardship may be dealt with. Mr. Fisher quotes from his circular of Jan. 10, in which the statement was made that the remuneration of commissioners and enumerators would be according to rates of allowance to be epared by the minister, which rates the census act provides should not exceed in the aggregate a total amount of \$3 for each day of proved effective service for any enumerator, or \$4 for each day of like service for any com-missioner. No promise of a different basis of remuneration, the minister says, has been given to commissioners or enumerators by the depart-ment of agriculture or the census office, nor has any person been authorized to intimate or suggest that any other basis be adopted. The present rates for enumerators are more liberal than those of ten years ago by 50 to 66 per cent, as shown by the following comparative table of salaries:

The rate for commissioners is also more favorable, being one cent per head, or over \$5 per hundred families, instead of \$4 per hundred families in 1891. The allowance of a lump sum to commissioners, in addition to the rates, is practically the same for both census

Under the regulations of the present census eight hours constitutes a day's work and all overtime is allowd as part of a day at the rate of time per hour provided for a day's work; and in the rural districts of the old provinces of the Dominion an enumerator who employs a horse to expedite the work is entitled to a further allow ance of \$1 50 per day of 24 hours.

In 1881 n limit was fixed to the length of a day's work, and no allowance was made for the employment of a horse. The aggregate earnings of an enumerator are calculated on the total number of persons, deaths, farms and factories enumerated at the rates provided in the table; but so as not to exceed an average of \$3 per eight hours of proved effective service, exclusive of the item of horse hire. The enumeration in eight hours of six families and six farms in rural districts, or twelve families in cities and towns (allowing an average of five persons per family, and in 1891 it was 5.2), would suffice, at the rates provided in the table, to earn \$3; and if the enumerator worked ten or twelve hours, instead of eight, he might at the same rates make 3 75 or

With respect to cases of hardship, the minister states: "I must now desire you, as commissioner, to proceed to make up the accounts of your enumerators on the schedule of rates sup-plied. If in any case you find that the full allowance of \$3 per day of eight hours has not been earned, and if you consider that the enumerators have exercised due diligence in their work, I am willing that you should make a report of the circumstances which lead you to believe that they ought te have special consideration or special allowance. If, with a statement of the facts and circumstances, you make a recommendation for special consideration, and if a fair case seems to be made out, on which a special allowance can be based. I am prepared to say that the department will recog-nize it and make such special allowance. I am hopeful that in this way cases of hardship can be fairly dealt with, and I am glad to feel that I am justified in taking this course. It is quite contrary and quite impossible for us to adopt the suggestion of a flat rate of \$2 per day to all enumerators, without regard to the work done. Every claim must be sustained by its own merits, and if reasonable and equitable it will be passed and paid without delay."
