ANOTHER SCARE. A more alarming and disastrous outbreak of smallpox is a probability in Ontario next autumn, according to Dr. Hodgetts. Reviewing his inspec tion of the outbreak in Brant county, the report states that he visited the townships of Burford, Oakland and Windham. Dr. Hodgetts states that he inspected 34 houses where small-pox was supposed to exist. They were inhabited by 154 persons. Of these 98 had smallpox. Of the 154 no less than 81 were unvaccinated. Dr. Hodgetts traced the infection to a house in Brantford, where the person had deficit of \$225.267. This announcement brought it from London. SMALL COST OF SMALLPOX IN LONDON

Remarkably Economical Management of the Outbreak.

Total Expense Kept Within the Surprisingly Low Sum of Eighteen Hundred Dollars.

Ratepayers who expected a big bill of expense for the smallpox outbreak will be agreeably disappointed, as \$1, 800 will cover the whole thing, hospital maintenance and all. This is a surprisingly small total. Assistant City Treasurer Bell made an estimate this morning and placed the cost at \$1, 749 09, with a couple of small bills yet to be added in. At the beginning of the year the board of health asked for \$5,-000, thinking that the disease would cost the city that sum, if not more. In Hamilton, where the hospital was established only a few weeks ago, and is now unused, the bills amounted to nearly \$2,000. Here it has been in operation since the middle of February. Dr. Cl. T. Campbell, chairman of the board of health, believes that London has made a record in the matter of economical maintenance of an isolation hospital. No other place in Canada has done anything like so well. In some localities even \$1,000 expense has been incurred by a single case. The city is under a debt of gratitude to him and the other members of the board for the exercise of such unusual prudence in an occasion when large-sized oills are considered inevitable; most credit really belongs to Dr. Hutchinson. He would have been strictly within his legitimate right to have sent a doctor out there, and that would have meant an expenditure of \$10 a day at the very least—in Hamilton the salary bill for almost five weeks was \$110 a week-but instead, he had a professional male nurse, and a fifth-year

medico go out, and supervised the management of the hospital by telephone. When, in serious cases, it was absolutely necessary, he went to the hospital himself. The disinfecting arrange-ments were of the best, the apparatus being placed in a separate building, where the doctor kept a special suit of clothes, which he donned before entering the main building. This in itself shows an unusual and highly commendable devotion, both to duty and to the city's interests. By this means he saved more than \$1,000. "There is no smallpox here now, of

Thomas La Bell, who was fishing nearby, hurried to the wharf, and with the first throw of his fish line, the hook caught in the waist of Rosa Lupa. The bodies came up together till clasped in the embrace of death
