GOOD PLACE TO LEAVE

Nearly All the British Residents Have Deserted Fez.

London, Jan. 13.—The latest advice received here from Fez say that with the exception of the members of the staff of Gen. Sir Harry MacLean, commander of the Sultan's bodyguard, the British residents, including the women missionaries, left Fez on Jan. 8, and have since arrived at the coast.

TRAGEDY AT ST. CATHARINES

Mr. Notman, a Respected Resident, Shoots Himself.

St. Catharines, Ont., Jan. 13.— Alex Notman, a respected resident, committed suicide by shooting this morning.

He had not been well for some time, and last night his wife, knowing he was worse, got up from her bed and went to call his brother. During her absence her husband secured a revolver, which he hid under his pillow.

Notman was 33 years old, a machinist, and leaves a wife and two small children.

POLITICAL POINTS

Ontario Legislature May Meet Next Month—Center Bruce Case.

Toronto, Jan. 13.—Indications point to a meeting of the Legislature early next month.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at Montreal, laughed at and denied the story that he is to retire from the Government.

North Ontario Liberals will convene at Beaverton on Thursday, Jan. 22, to choose a candidate for the bye-election to oppose George E. Foster.

Judge MacLennan has made an order in the Center Bruce election case, postponing the delivery of particulars, due today, until 48 hours after the conclusion of the examination of the respondent, Hugh Clark, M.P.P., which is now going on.

SQUEEZING HIM DRY.

EXPECT BIGGER G. T. R. DIVIDENDS

Shareholders Encouraged by the Road's Prosperity—Feeling Against Extension

London, Jan. 13.—It is stated that the Grand Trunk board of directors, in view of bumper traffic receipts, intend to show a little less conservatism regarding dividends. Indeed, the third preference holders are hoping to again enter the dividend list, for the second half of 1902, probably receiving a dividend of from 1 to 1 1/2 per cent.

A shareholder, writing to the Financial Times, says that if the Grand Trunk directors propose to support financially the Grand Trunk Pacific project, the shareholders must oppose it in every legitimate way. He says the commitment of the Grand Trunk to such a tremendous new engagement would be like reverting to the Tyler regime.

ST. LAWRENCE ROUTE.
Lloyd's correspondent, writing in the Times again, is pursuing the St. Lawrence route, and asks why the Elder-Dempsters, in claiming immunity from accident is on the St. Lawrence route, omitted mentioning the stranding of the Montague near Fame Point on July 12. What the Times' correspondent fails to note, however, is that the Liverpool marine court decided the disaster was due to the master's fault, and was in no way due to the nature of the St. Lawrence route.

FIERCE FIGHTING GOING ON AT FEZ

The Followers of the Pretender Overwhelm Sultan's Troops—Anxiety at Rabat.

Madrid, Jan. 13.—Fighting is proceeding between the troops of the Sultan of Morocco and the forces of the pretender to the throne, according to a dispatch received by the Globe from Fez. The followers of the pretender are said to be overcoming the imperial troops. The correspondent of the Globe adds that the inhabitants of Fez have risen against the Sultan, and that anxiety reigns at Rabat, where the Europeans are in favor of an immediate attack by the pretender's forces. The Sultan's representative at Tangier has been ordered to seize cattle and dispatch reinforcements to the Sultan.

KIPLING AN AMERICAN?

A lively press discussion has been going on in Berlin as to whether Rudyard Kipling is an Englishman or an American. The discussion arose from the Vossische Zeitung's hinting that his last poem, "The Rovers," led to the downfall of Dr. von Holleben, the German ambassador to the United States, as Dr. von Holleben originally brought the poem to Emperor William's notice.

The Kreuz Zeitung, a Clerical-Conservative organ, has now settled the question for itself by announcing that Kipling is a Jew.

PRINCESS LOUISE MAY LEAVE GIRON

Not to Return to Her Husband, But to Go to Her Old Home in Austria.

Vienna, Jan. 13.—Great efforts are being made to induce the Crown Princess of Saxony to forsake M. Giron, whom she eloped, and return to Austria. If she consents her personal property will be guaranteed. She is urged to remember that her expected child ought to be born in circumstances befitting its rank.

It is believed here that she has shown an inclination to accept the proposition that she return to Austria. At a meeting of her lawyer and the lawyer of the Crown Prince, at which she was present, she was much more amenable to reason than formerly, and it is expected that she will return to her childhood home at Salzburg.

The bedroom in which she slept as a girl is being refurnished in anticipation of her return.

It is learned that the Crown Princess went to church at Geneva on Sunday for the first time since she arrived there.

Her brother, Archduke Leopold, who in Geneva Saturday, Mlle. Adamovich, whom the Archduke is said to be desirous of marrying, is very ill.

M. Giron still spends most of his time in Geneva. He has only rented a room in Lausanne.

SHE MAY GET NEARLY \$500,000

U. S. Senate Committee Recommend Provision for Ex-Queen "Lil."

Washington, Jan. 13.—The Senate committee on Porto Rico and the Pacific Islands recommends that "as an act both of justice and of national grace and wisdom, that the Senate consider with favor, on the lines indicated in their report, the claim of the late Queen Liliuokalani, now a royal private citizen of the United States, and make such reasonable provision for her as the facts may seem to justify."

The committee finds that Queen Liliuokalani has no personal interest in the crown lands which have been claimed for her, but only an official interest during her reign. Such interest would have entitled her to the rental of the lands, and the committee finds that from the time of the deposition, in 1893, to Sept. 1, last, the rental would have amounted to \$323,378.

They Must Pay Taxes.

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 13.— According to a decision handed down by Judge Thompson, of the U. S. court, in the case of the Western Assurance Company, of Toronto, Ont., against the treasurer and auditor of Franklin County, all foreign insurance companies having capital, income or other securities on deposit with the state treasurer must pay taxes on the same in Franklin County. In the suit of the Western Assurance Company, which sought to prevent the treasurer of \$200,000 worth of bonds which it has deposited with the treasurer, the court held against the company.

Hillard Precht and Ira Green were crushed to death while digging coal for their own use in a private mine, near Williamsport, Pa.

William McBride's harness shop and A. H. Lawrence's photography studio, at Alliston, Ont., were completely destroyed by fire this (Tuesday) morning. Mr. Lawrence saved considerable of the contents of his place, but Mr. McBride suffered an almost total loss.

PASSING THROUGH THE DARDANELLES

The British Embassy Brings the Turk—Hamid Found It a Case of "Have To."

Constantinople, Jan. 13.—The British embassy here has secured the issue of an imperial decree granting the Khedivial Navigation Company, of Alexandria, Egypt, the same privileges for its ships, to go hence through the Dardanelles without stopping, as enjoyed by other companies. The embassy had been agitating the question with no result until it recently ordered the Khedivial steamer El Kahira to pass through the straits without stopping. This was accomplished without incident. When the Porte was notified of the embassy's action an irate was promptly issued, but before the steamer's departure, granting the company the privilege required.

The Porte has not yet replied to Great Britain's protest against Turkey's allowing Russian torpedo boats to pass through the Dardanelles. No other power has pronounced itself on the question.

After waiting for two years to obtain the same privileges for the Khedivial Navigation Company, as other companies enjoy, namely, that its ships may pass through the Dardanelles, the British embassy determined to wait no longer and instructed the steamer El Kahira, bound for Alexandria, to pass through the Dardanelles without stopping. This decision has the effect of ignoring the Sultan's suzerainty over things Egyptian.

PRUSSIAN DIET REOPENED TODAY

A Speech From the Throne Takes a Gloomy View of Finances.

Berlin, Jan. 13.—The Prussian Diet was reopened today. The Chancellor, Count Von Bülow, read the speech from the throne. No mention was made of foreign matters, nor of the canal bill. The speech took a gloomy view of the finances of Prussia. It said the accounts for 1901 closed with a deficit of \$3,375,000, and added that it was not only reported that the accounts for 1902 would be appreciably more satisfactory. As for 1903, a deficit would have to be made on public credit for a considerable loan, in order to establish equilibrium, being the revenue and the expenditure, as in consequence of the depression in agriculture, trade and industry, a further depression in the receipts of several of the administrative departments would result.

Bills were announced for furthering the demarcation of the Polish provinces of Prussia, for their economic development, and for business and agricultural officials and teachers there. To improve the administration of the railways and for
