MRS. PATRICK'S DEEP DEVOTION

"I Shall Work for My Husband's Freedom Until Nails Fall From My Fingers," She Says.

New York, May 5.—The World says: Mrs. Albert T. Patrick, who was Mrs. Francis until her marriage in the Tombs to the convicted man, fairly declared as she stood in the front porch of her home, No. 315 West 88th street, and declared that she would yet prove the innocence of her husband. A new inspiration had come to her, she said, with her marriage to the condemned lawyer. Her face flushed with the vigor of her declamatory remarks. She gesticulated in forcible manner as she exclaimed in a loud, shrill tone:

"My husband is not a guilty man, and I shall live to prove it. God has given me the power. I have the ability. I have evidence of his innocence, and there is more to come in his favor. I shall not tell you the nature of this evidence. It shall all be known in time. I can prove a thousand things—yes, a thousand things, all of which will prove the innocence of the man I am married—yes, honored—to call husband."

"I have known Albert T. Patrick for several years, and I know that he could not have perpetrated the killing of old man Rice without my knowing. He could not have engineered such a scheme of murder and conspiracy without my knowledge. I can prove that."

"But I do not dwell on appearances to clear Albert T. Patrick. I have discovered something more tangible and more convincing—something that can be brought before a judge and jury; evidence of a most convincing character."

"If Prosecutor Osborne was in this room now I would scratch his very eyes out of his head. I would teach him that he cannot send every innocent man to a murderer's cell and escape the wrath of a woman who loves the man through whose conviction he, as a prosecutor, obtains glory and is credited with being a clever lawyer. I am not at all excited. I am quite cool. But I cannot help expressing my contempt for Osborne."

"I have made up my mind and have sealed the resolution with prayers uttered at my bedside. I shall work for Albert T. Patrick's exoneration until I have worked my nails from my fingers or my body into the grave."

19 BARGES SENT TO THE RIVER BOTTOM!

Another Mishap on the Ohio—Steamer Becomes Unmanageable.

Memphis, Tenn., May 3.—Because of an accident to the gearing of one of the engines of the towboat B. B. Finley yesterday the vessel drifted about the barge in the river in the vicinity of Priors Point, Miss., carrying destruction in her path. The vessel was the most uncontrollable, and sank 19 of the 38 coal barges in tow, including the model barge Texas, which was heavily laden with steel rails. The heaviest loss is a total loss. No lives were lost.

WILHELMINA LIKELY TO DIE

Her Majesty's Condition Is Very Critical.

The Anxious Watchers at Her Bedside Had No Sleep Sunday Night.

The Hague, May 5.—It was announced from Castle Loo at midnight last night that Wilhelmina had been prematurely confined at 6 o'clock Sunday evening. At 11 o'clock Sunday evening the condition of her majesty was described as critical and small hope for her recovery was entertained.

A message from Castle Loo, sent at 7 o'clock this morning, says Queen Wilhelmina is still alive. None of the doctors attending her majesty left the palace last night, and neither the queen mother nor the prince consort went to bed.

POTTER PALMER DEAD

For Fifty Years One of Chicago's Prominent Business Men.

Chicago, May 4.—Potter Palmer, for nearly half a century one of Chicago's most prominent business men, died tonight at his residence on Lake Shore Drive. His fortune is estimated at \$25,000,000.

Helena, Mont., May 5.—Hugh McQuaid dropped dead of heart disease in the lobby of the Cosmopolitan Hotel Saturday. McQuaid was an early settler and reported the latter massacre for the Associated Press. For many years he was editor of the Helena Independent.

New York, May 5.—Capt. Hiram Pugh, who has just died at Bridgeton, N. J., had not slept in a bed since he returned from the Civil war. When he was taken ill some weeks ago his doctor ordered him to bed, but he resisted all efforts to make him obey the order and died "with his boots on."

Toronto, May 5.—William Langford, youngest son of Rev. Dr. Langford, of Owen Sound, died at his father's home at 6 p.m. yesterday. Deceased was in his 31st year. He was a brother of Prof. Langford, of Victoria College.

AN OCEAN LINER DAMAGED BY FIRE.

Steamer Forest Home, of Home Line, Scorched at Montreal—Loss Amounts to \$200,000.

Montreal, May 5.—A destructive fire started shortly before 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon in the steamship Forest Home, of the Home Line. The vessel arrived in port last Saturday with 26,000 boxes of lemons, 5,000 boxes of oranges and 5,400 bags of sulphur. The lemons and oranges had been safely landed, and the men were unloading the sulphur when fire was discovered by some seaman in No. 2 hold, which was loaded with sulphur.

There was an immediate rush for a place of safety on the part of the men. The firemen were called to the scene, but the vessel was so badly damaged before the flames were subdued.

The damage by the fire is estimated at \$200,000.

PRISONER PARE DEAD

Passed Away in Prison—In Three Days His Term Would Have Expired

Kingston, Ont., May 5.—On Saturday afternoon Pate, the leader in the attack some years ago on the Dominion Bank, Napanee, and who afterwards turned Queen's evidence and got off with three years in Kingston penitentiary, died in the prison hospital within three days of the expiration of his sentence, a victim to gangrene. Last year, as a result of a hurt contracted by a fall while escaping from Napanee jail, Pate had his left leg amputated at the knee. He recovered, and was about for some time when the affection asserted itself in his other limb. His strength was speedily sapped and he grew weaker and weaker.

It is said that he bequeathed all his money, of which he possessed considerable, to his sister residing in Montreal. During his incarceration Pate was a good, willing prisoner, and did his work well. For a year or more he was quite sickly, and confined more or less to the hospital.

The friends of the deceased prisoner have been notified, and a reply has been received that his remains will be claimed by parties who will reach the city on Monday.

Toronto, May 5.—Premier Ross will today enter upon a week of arduous campaigning, which will doubtless be steadily maintained until polling day. As already announced, he will speak tonight at Sarnia in the interests of Mr. F. E. Pattison, ex-M.P. in the West Lambton; tomorrow night at St. Catharines, in support of Mr. D. J. McKinnon, in Lincoln; on Thursday night at Cornwall, where Mr. W. J. McCall is the Liberal standard-bearer, and on Friday afternoon at Alexandria, in the interests of Mr. D. M. McPherson, in Glengarry.

Four evening meetings for the following week have also been arranged as follows: Stratford, Monday, May 12; Ailsa Craig, Tuesday, May 13; Midland, Thursday, May 15; Owen Sound, Friday, May 16.

The premier's tour thus far has been most satisfactory. A very large audience has greeted him in every instance, and the enthusiasm has been most gratifying to the well-wishers of Liberalism. The physical part of the campaign, while very trying, has not impaired Mr. Ross' brilliancy and convincing force; in fact, his addresses seem to gather weight and sparkle as the campaign progresses.
