REVOLT REACHES VLADIVOSTOCK

Russian Sailors Start a Reign of Terror.

CHINESE SECTION SET AFIRE

Troops Shoot Rioters by Hundreds—Fresh Outbreaks in Siberia and South Russia.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 14.—A state of war has been declared in Vladivostock. Private advices say that the Chinese quarter has been entirely destroyed and that the uprising is now under control.

Russia is on the brink of another general strike. The councilmen of workmen's delegates, in accordance with the programme of Social-Democrats at a meeting tonight, resolved to obtain a working day of eight hours by revolutionary means if necessary. All employers are determined to oppose the demand, and the situation is critical.

San Francisco, Nov. 14.—A dispatch from Vladivostock, received here, said that the Chinese quarter has been entirely destroyed and that the uprising is now under control.

Odessa, Nov. 14.—News has reached here of fresh disorders in the small town of Kishineff, in which over 100 persons were killed and the town was sacked and half burned.

The Disturbance at Kishineff. A telegram from Kishineff was received today by State Bank here. It read: Colossal disturbances. Outside of Kishineff hundreds of villages have been ruined. In the town of Kishineff with large commercial interests near Kishineff 200 houses are burned down, 600 families reduced to poverty, 3,000,000 rubles lost. Help absolutely necessary. The telegram was sent by a firm of Kishineff bankers in reply to an inquiry about conditions in Russia sent by Arnold Kohn, vice-president of the State Bank.

Mob Attacks Treasury. Yenisek, Siberia, Nov. 14.—The troops here were forced to intervene today and scatter a mob which was attacking the treasury, the police station and the residences of the rich. The scarcity of food was one of the causes of the outbreak.

Half a dozen governors, including the governors of Odessa, Tomsk and Kazan, who signify failed to prevent disorders have been summarily dismissed at Count Witte's instigation.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 14.—The upheaval in Russia following the promulgation of the reform manifesto has now reached Vladivostock and Yenisek and other extreme points of the empire. Confirmation has been obtained from various sources of the reported uprising at Vladivostock where the condition of affairs is quite critical. Many persons have been killed and the foreigners have taken refuge on the ships in the harbor. Many public buildings, stores and houses have been pillaged and set fire to by the mob.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 14.—The American embassy has received from Consul Greener at Vladivostock details of the outbreak which began Sunday afternoon immediately after the departure of the Russian armored cruisers Kronos and Russia.

The people who had gathered in great crowds in the streets became excited by inflammatory speeches. Many soldiers and sailors were also in an angry mood, having expected to go home with the squadron.

The mob began to break windows and pillage, and in the evening a fire broke out in the Golden Horn Hotel, and several blocks of Chinese buildings in the northern part of the city, and to the officers' residences and other buildings in the eastern quarter. The fires burned all night.

Troops were summoned to restore order and fired frequent volleys, killing many persons.

Just before the American consul telegraphed today the commandant of the fortress at Vladivostock, assisted by police and the leaders of the workmen's associations, addressed the mob, urging them to keep the peace, but the consul said he feared the attempt would be vain.

The consul added that twenty-four merchant vessels in the harbor were on board a steamer when he sent this dispatch, and he expected to remain there.

Poles Want Common Freedom. St. Petersburg, Nov. 14. Count Witte today received from the Warsaw committee of the Social Democracy of Poland and Lithuania an indignant telegraphic address in which the charge that the present movement in Poland is designed to secure separation. DEER HUNTERS IN QUARANTINE

Rumor That Several Londoners Are Being Held in North Hastings.

"Deer hunting? I call it deer hunting. Why, deer are as scarce up there as steamboats on the Thames. I never saw anything like it."

This is what Inspector McCullum, who has just returned from the wilds of New Ontario, told an Advertiser reporter today.

"I will tell you that I didn't shoot anything—because I didn't see anything to shoot at. One of my mates shot a deer, and he gave me a piece of it. And after hearing it up, I find that this piece of deer stands me exactly \$2.50 a pound."

Mr. McCullum states that the party got into a piece of woods where the thicket was so dense they could see nothing. They also ran into fourteen inches of snow and were compelled to the up so that in the morning they looked like smoked herrings when they crawled out of the tent.

AN ALARMING RUMOR. A persistent rumor was going the rounds Tuesday that the party which went up to West Hastings, and of which Mr. E. J. MacRobert, the well-known school teacher, had been quarantined because of an outbreak of smallpox in the vicinity of the district in which they were hunting. Several Indians having been taken ill with the disease.

None of the relatives of the interested parties have heard of the quarantined, however, and it is understood that a week ago one of the party came back and reported great sport and all well. Hunters always laugh at each other's misfortunes, and many of Mr. MacRobert's friends expressed a friendly delight when they heard that the Londoners were behind bars in the wilds of North Hastings.

JOTTINGS FROM NEAR-BY PLACES

HARRISTSVILLE. Harriestville, Nov. 13.—Claude Finch, of London, spent Sunday with his parents here.

M. M. Monahoff, in a strong article, warns the Government that it would be fatal to spill the blood of Poland, arguing that autonomy could be granted without doing the empire, and with such a solution Russia could always count on the powerful firm friendship of the Polish people.

The radical press today is not sparing in its denunciation of the Government's action at putting Poland under martial law, declaring that it is a plain violation of the spirit of the reform manifesto, but it is evident that the Government has recovered its nerve and is determined to use severe measures if necessary to restore order.

Peasants Lynch Thieves. Warsaw, Nov. 14.—At Pultusk the peasants organized for the purpose of driving out or lynching the thieves who took advantage of the present disturbances to loot and plunder. The lynchings killed eleven and fearfully mutilated twenty of the thieves.

Several newspapers have been arrested in Warsaw this morning by the police, who searched their offices.

Protesters against the declaration of martial law gathered at London last night and were fired on by infantry. Nine persons were wounded.

The city is suffering from a shortage of food. The population, though greatly angered by the Government communication regarding autonomy, has up to the present, been self-restrained.

WHAT SEARCH REVEALED

Mr. Scarrow Alleged To Have Sold Land Not in His Name.

Yesterday W. H. Bartram, barrister, went through the records in the city registry office to secure information re the purchasing of land for the breakwater by the city of London from Mr. Scarrow.

Mr. Bartram found that though 179 feet were deeded to the city by Mr. Scarrow, that gentleman had only a deed for 100 feet, and that Mr. Scarrow claims that the city of London has no right to recognize Mr. Scarrow's sovereignty over 79 feet of land, which, he says, belongs to the city.

The deed states that the city purchased 166 feet of land, of which Mr. Scarrow had a deed, and 23 feet of land which Mr. Scarrow claimed to own fee simple, as he had occupied it for twenty years or more.

On the other hand Mr. Bartram states that in 1899 the courts compelled Mr. Scarrow to remove his barn from the property and to take down his fence.

MRS. MACKENZIE DEAD

Eighty-Six Years Old, and Spent Almost Entire Life Near London.

There passed away in Hyde Park yesterday a highly respected and widely known resident of that neighborhood, Mrs. Mary Mackenzie, daughter of the late Donald Macdonald, of this city.

The late Mrs. Mackenzie had been ill for a considerable time. She was born in Pictou, Nova Scotia, 86 years ago, coming to this vicinity while quite young and spending the balance of her days within a short distance of London.

Two sons and five daughters remain to mourn her loss—Alex, of Arizona, and Donald of Hyde Park; and Mrs. George Routledge, Mary, Elizabeth, Annie and Katherine at home. Mr. Donald Macdonald, of Winnipeg, is a brother of deceased.

The funeral will be held on Thursday, and Dr. Dickson, of the Presbyterian Church will conduct the services.
