WHAT SEARCH REVEALED

Land Not In His Name.

Yesterday W. H. Bartram, barrister, went through the records in the city registry office to secure informa-tion re the purchasing of land for the breakwater by the city of London from Scarrow Mr. Bartram found that though 179 feet were deeded to the city by Mr. Scarrow, that gentleman had only a deed for 156 feet. Thus Mr. Bartram claims that the city of London has no right to recognize Mr. Scarrow's sovereignty over 23 feet of land, which, he

says, belongs to the city.

The deed states that the city pur chased 155 feet of land, of which Mr. Scarrow had a deed, and 23 feet of land which Mr. Scarrow claimed to own fee simple, as he had occupied it for twenty years or more.
