THE PROPOSED GERRYMANDER
OF MIDDLESEX.Prior to confederation this county
had two ridings only—East and West
Middlesex. By the British North
America act it was divided into the
three ridings, exactly as they now are,
except as altered by the enlargement
of the boundaries of the city of Lon-
don. There has been no other change
in any of the Middlesex constituencies
so far as the Ontario Legislature is
concerned, since 1867.When South Middlesex was created
by the Dominion gerrymander, with
the object of "hiving the Grits," an
awkward situation was created. Elec-
tors lived in one riding for Dominion
election purposes, and in another for
provincial purposes. It was with sat-
isfaction that they welcomed the re-
turn to the former arrangement as
determined at confederation.There may be nothing whatever in
the suggestion that the county is to
be gerrymandered so as to make two
Conservative ridings and one Reform.
It is with the intention of forestalling
what would be regarded as an act of
gross injustice that attention is called
to the fact that the ridings were fixed
by the British North America act, and
have so remained until the present
time. This circumstance alone should
settle the question, and prevent any
change being attempted.

DISOWNED BY FORMER FRIENDS.

Significant in connection with the
provincial election campaign now in
progress in New Brunswick, is the fact
that the Conservative Opposition in
that province disclaims any connection
with the federal Conservatives. The
opponents of the Robinson Govern-
ment fear their cause will suffer un-
less the public mind is disabused of
the idea that they are in any way al-
lied with the collection of incapables
behind Mr. Borden. They no doubt
see in their namesakes at Ottawa a
band of men with whom the country's
interests are as nothing compared with
their own self-seeking. They must
have in mind the revelations of the
insurance investigation, and the dubi-
ous operations of Messrs. Foster, Le-
furgey, Pope, Fowler and other lead-
ers of the Dominion Conservative
party. They have before them even
now the discreditable tactics of the
obstructionists, during the present
session; how they have held up pub-
lic business for months, and wasted
hundreds of thousands of dollars of
the public money in fruitless endeav-
ors to secure campaign material,
only to lay bare their own
misdeeds when in office; how even
their leader, a man who once enjoyed
a reputation as a broad-minded and
well-meaning public man, hampered
only by the littleness of those with
whom he had the misfortune to be
surrounded, has fallen to their level.
Remembering all this, is it any won-
der that the Conservative party of
New Brunswick, in its intense desire to
gain office, tell the electors of that
Province that they are not of the
same kin as the Borden, the Foster,
the Fowlers, and the rest of them?
No one can blame the New Brunswick
Conservatives for thus disowning the
men who have brought discredit on
the party name. The Federal Opposi-
tion, by its present course, is putting
a strain on the party loyalty of good
Conservatives in every province.

THE BRITISH LICENSING BILL.

The British Government has taken
its life in its hands by the introduction
of a radical temperance measure. The
"trade" in Great Britain is a mighty
force in politics. Its whole power will
be directed to the overthrow of the
administration, and its natural alli-
ance with the Unionist party will be
strengthened and confirmed.The bill brought down by Mr. As-
quith provides for the extinction in
twenty years of 30,000 licenses, or
one-third of the whole number now in
existence. This will be effected by a
provision allowing only one license to
750 persons in cities and 400 in rural
districts. In Ontario the unit is one
license to 600 in cities and towns, and
one to 400 in the country. Local
councils are to govern the issuance of
new licenses, and a majority of the
electors of a parish is sufficient to
prohibit the granting of one; but the
dispatches do not make it clear
whether this means a majority of the
electors who go to the polls, or of the
total number on the list. It is notstated either, where there are provi-
sions for reducing licenses indefinitely
by local option. The permission to
sell liquor during certain hours on
Sunday shows that Great Britain is
still a long way behind Ontario, al-
though the new bill marks a big ad-
vance in the old land.With the state church arrayed
against the educational bill, and the
liquor trade against the license bill,
the Government has raised two pow-
erful enemies, but it will rally the
Nonconformists to its support, and
will rely on the growth of temperance
sentiment.

INDICTED AS DISLOYAL.

The highest tribunal in British Col-
umbia, in full court, has unanimously
declared the anti-Japanese legislation
of the Provincial Legislature to be
invalid.This judgment was given on an
appeal by the Attorney-General of
the Province from the decision of
Chief Justice Hunter, who ordered the
release of two Japanese imprisoned at
the instance of the Provincial authori-
ties. The three other members of the
court agreed with the arguments and
conclusion of the chief justice, and the
ill-timed and ill-advised Bower act
is thus erased without the interven-
tion of the Federal Government.The words of Mr. Justice Clement
were particularly impressive. "I must
say," he said, "it smacks strongly of
disloyalty to our settled form of
government, when the authorities of
one Province should undertake to
override and render abortive the
will of the people of Canada."The judge might have gone even
further and imputed to the politicians
of British Columbia disloyalty not
only to Canada, but to the empire. The
agreement between Ottawa and Tokio
was prompted by imperial considera-
tions, and relieved the Imperial Gov-
ernment of a grave difficulty. The
Legislature of the Coast Province, in
trying to override it, insulted Great
Britain's ally, flouted the Canadian
constitution, and threw fresh cares
upon the British Government. The
McBride administration had two mo-
tives in making trouble. It wanted to
cater to anti-Oriental feeling and to
embarrass the Federal Government
for party reasons. In this ignoble
and unpatriotic conduct it has been
aided and abetted by the Federal Op-
position. And the mischiefmakers are
leaders of the Conservative party,
which poses as the super-loyal and
imperial party.February goes tomorrow, and the
backbone of winter shows no sign of
lumbering up.The C. P. R., with \$29,000,000 cash in
its treasury, laughs in the face of the
monetary stringency.One hundred inches of snow have
fallen in Ottawa this year. This should
be sufficient to cover the mud thrown
by the Opposition.Sir Wilfrid Laurier says that he has
seen his Minister of Agriculture behind
a plow. Mr. Fisher's predecessors in
that office scarcely knew a plow from
a rail fence.The story is that the Whitney
Government will split the difference
with the Dominion Alliance, and make
the requirement 55 per cent instead of
60 per cent in a local option vote.
This would be making two bites of a
cherry and there would be no settled
principle in such a juggling with
fractions.Dr. Thompson, M. P. for the Yukon,
declares that Canada must rise to a
plane of equality with other nations
and that independence of some form
must come. Dr. Thompson is half
right, Canada must and will be some-
thing on equal footing with sovereign
states, including the mother country,
and she is fast rising to that position
without thought of severing British
connection, and with no straining of
the imperial tie. It is the genius of
the British Empire to permit such an
evolution.

means of trebling our exports to the
French market.

TO GREAT BRITAINSir Wilfrid Says It Is Very Sat-
isfactory—Caution On the
Pacific Needed.Ottawa, Feb. 27.—Dr. Thompson
(Yukon) led a discussion in the House
today on the treaty-making power
and Canada's relation to British
diplomacy. He criticised the repeated
concessions made by Britain to the
United States, as, he said, at Cana-
da's expense, and stated that a ma-
jority of Canadians would sym-
pathize with the United States in case
of a war with Japan. He declared
that seeking friendship of the United
States had become Britain's mania, no
matter how Canada might suffer.
"The time has arrived," he said, "when
Canada should have her own navy,
and come to a plane of equality with
the other nations of the world. Inde-
pendence of some form must come.
Canada's great protection at present
was the Monroe doctrine."
Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in reply to Dr.
Thompson's sweeping assertions, said
that while Canada's relation to Great
Britain might show some anomalies,
yet he believed, in view of the true
Canada had no cause for complaint. This
statement was applauded by both sides
of the House.The Premier went on to say that the
situation on the Pacific was one calling
for close attention, but he predicted
that there would remain a condition
of firm friendship with Japan.
Hon. W. S. Fielding said occasional
friction could scarcely be obviated. He
did not think there were any con-
siderable number of persons in Cana-
da who looked for any radical change
in Canada's constitution and relation to
the empire. Such a speech, he said,
was liable to create the impression
abroad that Canada had dissatisfied
with her position and status, and such
impression would be most regrettable.
Canadians were proud to form part of
the British Empire.Dr. Sproule said the finance minis-
ter had believed, in view of the true
opinion of the Canadian people, though
Dr. Thompson's remarks regarding
British diplomacy contained much
